(1) PROVIDE A DESCRIPTION OF THE ACTIVITY

This activity featured Dr. Junie Cho, a world renowned concert pianist, who performed a selection of Baroque, Classical era, and Romantic era keyboard music for our students. Dr. Cho fly to California from the university where she teaches in North Carolina. While she was in residency at CSUCI, Dr. Cho performed for both our Monday and Tuesday sections of PAMU 337 "Music in History". Dr. Cho introduced each piece of music with insights into the individual composers, and the compositions themselves.

(2) HOW DID THE ACTIVITY RELATE TO A COURSE(S) AND/OR LEARNING OBJECTIVES?

Our two sections of PAMU 337 have been learning about music and composers of the Baroque era, the Classical style period, and the Romantic era. Dr. Junie Cho customized a special program of keyboard music for our classes, to feature the composers from those time periods. Dr. Cho performed music by J.S. Bach, Handel, Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven, Scarlatti, and Robert Schumann. Dr. Cho prefaced each performance with a description of the composition's form, rhythm, and other compositional features. Our classes are learning about all those musical elements, so getting Dr. Cho's expert commentary was also valuable to the students.

Our students learn about this music through their textbook, my lectures, and from various sound recordings and You-Tube videos. This LIVE musical demonstration brought all those sounds and concepts home to the students via an up-close and personal experience. Our students were also able to ask questions of our guest artist. Dr. Cho also answered questions about her own development as a young musician, and her practicing schedule. That information was enlightening for our student musicians who attended these two events.

(3) WHAT DO YOU SEE AS THE STRENGTHS OF THE ACTIVITY?

The strength of this activity was having a world-class performer visit our campus for two days of piano recitals. Dr. Cho has performed at Carnegie Hall, the United Nations building, the Kennedy Center, and many other famous concert venues. The strength of Dr. Cho's performance and her expert commentary about the compositions being performed gave our students an insider's view of the work of the world's most famous composers. Her



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Discussions of the musical forms, styles, and rhythms of each composition gave our students a further insight into this music. Our students also had a chance to ask questions of this fantastic visiting artist.

(4) WHAT WOULD YOU SAY ARE/WERE THE ACTIVITY'S WEAKNESSES?

The only weakness is that CSUCI does not possess a suitable performance space to feature such a high-level visiting artist. As several students commented, the Malibu Hall multipurpose rooms where we are forced to hold our concerts are very ugly. CI really needs a dedicated performing arts center that can at least compete with the nice performance facilities that all the community colleges around us have.

(5) HOW WOULD YOU IMPROVE THIS ACTIVITY FOR NEXT TIME?

No improvements are necessary. Everything was great.

(6) WHAT DID YOU LEARN FROM THE PROCESS?

This was Dr. Cho's seconds appearance for our IRA funded concerts. The experience reinforced to me that our students really benefited this excellent demonstration of classical piano compositions. Live music presentations such as this one greatly enhanced our students' understanding of the musical traditions that they are studying in class.

From this activity we were able to see the breakdowns of music composition from the Baroque, Classical and Romantic era. We usually watch video performances of different orchestras and instruments but it was great having a live performer explain different aspects of the compositions.

Live performances like this allow us students to take a better understanding of what the composers were trying to portrait in relation to the time they were in and to the techniques that they used. Dr. Cho broke down each composition and explained to the class what form each piece was in. She also gave a few key points about the composers' lives.

Having some explain the piece then play the piece live helps understand the meaning.

Helps bring a timeline to what is being learned and helps stimulate interest in the course.

I thought this activity was great in that it allowed students to not only hear the music that was being played during that time, but also watch a performer play the piece and see how they act as one with the music. It also allowed students to get one on one time with the performer and get any questions they have answered.

Watching an extremely talented musician play actual examples of music that we were studying made the lessons much more tangible and allowed me to relate much easier.

I found this piano concert to be a positive activity. I enjoyed attending this concert. It was informative, interesting, and enriching. This activity gave me the opportunity to see, hear, and learn more about the Baroque and Classical styles of music and about suites and sonatas. This concert provided me with more exposure to more examples of works by Handel, Bach, Haydn, Mozart, and Beethoven. In addition, Dr. Cho's concert offered me an introduction to the music of composers like Rameau and Scarlatti, with whom I was not familiar. Moreover, this activity reinforced the information from our class lectures, from our textbook, and from the listening guides. For example, our Music in History class hes been recently studying and reading about the "Baroque Era" and "Classicism" in our textbook, "The Enjoyment of Music." Furthermore, the program was a helpful, informative reference.

Positive strengths in this activity were the way she played made me realize it is not as easy as it sounds.

Being able to watch and listen someone perform the pieces that we are learning about in class was a great experience. It kind of took the music from 2D in the text to 3D. The intimacy was also great because we were able to ask Dr. Junie Cho questions, which is not something that we'd be able to do at a paid performance.

The performance was entertaining and very educational. The atmosphere was great.

It was very informative. The person presenting made it very simple and easy to understand with the content that was given.

It was amazing to actually see someone who is considered one of the best at what she does play for us. It was a wonderful experience that many of us may never get to experience again.

I was able to listen to music that I was learning in person.

Being able to get a real feel for how the works of J. S. Bach and W. A. Mozart should or could be played was helpful to understanding the complexity of the pieces. Dr. Junie Cho would would explain each piece in depth before playing them.

Hearing the performance love put the music in a whole different perspective. It made it more powerfull.

And this activity provided me with the experience of listening to Baroque and Classical styles of music as a live concert in person, beyond the audio examples from the textbook's chapter quizzes, listening guides, and listening quizzes. In addition, this concert provided me with more examples of works by such composers as Handel, Bach, Haydn, Mozart, and Beethoven. This piano recital gave me the opportunity to hear more examples of suites and sonatas.

This performance was related to the music content we are learning in class.

Dr. Junie Cho played musical pieces from composers that we are learning about in class.

Class Requirement

Showed how music from a previous era was played and how the compositions of these past songs came to be.

She played music from the many composers we had been studying and a few that we will study in the future.

Listened to composers works we are studying.

We had been studying about the Baroque and Classical Eras, and listened to the concert to wrap up those sections. This concert gave us an up close look at how pieces from these eras should sound.
