Brief Activity Description	This UNIV 392 proposes a fall 2015 3-unit course that will meet throughout the fall semester, and a 2-week trip to Taiwan, R.O.C., over winter break in January 2016. The trip will include travel to Taipei, New Taipei City, Tainan, Yilan County, and perhaps another location in Taiwan. Among visits to cultural sites and business establishments, we will have on campus interactive activities planned with local Universities. These interactive activities with local students and faculty are fostered by our special relationships in the Sociology Department with Soochow University and in the Business School with Tainan University.  The proposed UNIV 392 is well integrated into the framework of both sociology and business programs. As was the case the first time this course traded in fall 2012, it does not be strongthen of both programs their appeal above these capacitions with at ideath page.
	was funded in fall 2012, it draws on the strengths of both programs, their connections in Taiwan, and shares those connections with students across majors. The fall part of the course prepares students to maximize their time/experience while in Taiwan during the two-week trip in January (2016).
Learning Outcomes and Relation to IRA to Course Offerings	Learning Outcomes are congruent with and fulfill objectives in both Business and Sociology programs.  Students who successfully complete this course will be able to:  -Describe major social, business, and cultural issues in Taiwan  -Identify multiculturalism in Taiwan  -Understand the creative culture industry, international trade, technology and education sectors in Taiwan and their implications  -Understand the entrepreneurship and innovation environments in Taiwan  -Demonstrate their ability to explore and appreciate the diverse nature of Chinese traditions and culture in Taiwan  -Understand the vibrant history and culture of Taiwan  -Understand Taiwan's cultural, economic, and political relationships with China and the United States
	A visit to National Palace Museum (one of the top 10 museums in the world) links with BUS434 -The Museum: Culture, Business, objectives. The class will visit a science/technology park to learn about start-up businesses in the high-tech area, linking to MGT325 -Entrepreneurial Management. We will visit Social Enterprise Research Center ( <a href="http://serc.management.fju.edu.tw/">http://serc.management.fju.edu.tw/</a> ) at Fu-Jen Catholic University to learn about social business:

	BUS 203, SOC/BUS301 -Social Business Planning, and BUS/SOC336 -Social Entrepreneurship. Professor Shih (Soochow University) will lecture and guide a tour of a historical business district explaining social/business transformations in Taipei; linked to BUS349 -History of Business/Economics, SOC352 -Social Movements. Professor Shih will also lecture on sociological theory and accompany a visit to a religious site, incorporating SOC 420 -Classical Sociological Theory, SOC421 -Contemporary Sociological Theory, and SOC415 -Sociology of Religion. The student research project to be carried out in this class links with objectives in SOC350, SOC372, SOC374, among others.
Description of Assessment Process	We plan to assess the program in the following ways: (1) Examination of students' final projects to determine the content and subject mastery in terms of achievement of the course goals and objectives; (2) Student survey related to course objectives and the relationship of each trip element to the course objectives; (3) Focus group at the end of the trip in Taiwan to help in both collection of data related to assessment of goals and objectives as well as to help guide the design of the survey instrument used in #2, above.
