

#### <u>Purpose</u>

Inclusive Student Services (ISS) provides resources, services, and education to support the cultivation of an inclusive campus community. ISS supports all students, with a particular focus on marginalized populations, through mentorship, intercultural programs, retreats, workshops, and trainings. These various initiatives are geared towards fostering identity development, critical thinking, reflection, and dialogue across differences to support student retention and academic success



#### **Department Resource Highlights**

#### **Undocumented Student Ally Training Program**

Faculty, staff, and student employees on campus can choose to take part in our ally program to serve as allies to undocumented students on campus. The program offers three levels of training so that individuals can choose how involved they want to be and how much in depth knowledge they want. Students are able to identify allies by looking for "keys" posted around offices. Learn more about the Undocumented Student Ally Training Program.

#### Free Immigration Legal Services for Students and Employees

Direct immigration legal services are available free of charge to CSU students, employees and immediate relatives (i.e. parents, children, spouses, and siblings). Attorneys and paralegals are available to assist students with general consultations, DACA renewals and general assistance in filling out forms such as family-based petitions. This project aims to serve undocumented students, students with immigration questions, staff and faculty. Schedule a meeting with the immigration lawyer.

#### <u>Chicana/Latina Retreat</u> (<u>Spring</u>)



The Chicana Latina Retreat is geared towards student empowerment through political, cultural, environmental, and social consciousness development. By providing a safe, welcoming, and accepting environment for Chicana/Latina students, we hope to create a space conducive to community interaction as well as self-reflection. Given the high numbers of Chicana/Latina students on the CI campus, the goal is to cultivate leadership and address specific issues that Chicana/Latina college students face. Some Chicana/O Latina Leadership characteristics we hope to foster are: Strong cultural/ethnic identity, respect and love for the land/Tonantzin Tlalli/Mother Earth, Passion, Integrity, Respect, A sense of purpose, Consistency, Support and development of all Chicanas/Latinas, Empowerment and Hermanidad.



## <u>Chicano/Latino Retreat</u> <u>(Fall)</u>

Latino males continue to decline from the American higher education institutions, including at CSU Channel Islands. At CSUCI, the proportional representation of Latino males continue to lag behind females. As of fall 2016, Latina/Hispanic females constituted 34% of total enrollment (2,253) compared to Latino/Hispanic males 14% of total enrollment (925). According to CSUCI Institutional Research, Latino males have a higher dropout rate in their first and second year. To address these low attainment and dropout rates among Latino males. We seek to organize Chicano/Latino Student Male Retreat. The main objective of the Chicano/Latino Male Retreat is to empower undergraduate students to realize academic and life goals by increasing their engagement with resources, networking and opportunities at CSU Channel Islands. By providing a safe space, welcoming, and accepting environment for Chicano/Latino students at CSUCI, we hope to engage students in a dialogue, interaction, self-reflection, and activities that will increase their retention and graduation rates. In addition, the retreat will set the foundation for students to enhance their post-graduation success through workshops, mentorship and leadership development.

#### Noche de Familia @ CSUCI (every spring semester)

CSUCI students and their families are encouraged to come and meet the the CSUCI Chicanx and Latinx faculty, staff, and administrators at Noche de Familia. Free food and entertainment are provided. This event is bilingual in English and Spanish. This event embraces our multiculturalism and serves to support each other's education as a familia.

#### Raza College Day hosted by MEChA (every spring semester)

Movimiento Estudiantil Chicanx de Aztlan (MEChA) de CI hosts its Annual Raza College Day in an effort to reach out to the historically underrepresented youth in the surrounding community. Its goal is to expose the youth to a college environment while planting seeds of knowledge along the way. The day consists of keynote speakers, educational workshops, a student panel, and live performances.

#### Si Se Pudo Student Graduation Ceremony at CSUCI (every spring semester in May, Friday before commencement)

This event is a celebration for Chicana/o Latina/o graduating seniors. The goal is to acknowledge students and their families' support during the educational journey. It is open to all students; however, the event is bilingual and reflects the cultural values of the Raza community. At the event, students will receive recognition alongside two guests (family/supporters).



# <u>Black Students Stoling Ceremony (every spring semester in May, before commencement)</u>

This special event recognizes students along with their family and friends to mark the culmination of their student experience. As part of the ceremony, graduates will receive a traditional Kente cloth stole/sash which may be worn during the campus' Commencement celebration.

# Dolphins of Turtle Island Ceremony, (every spring semester in May, before commencement)

Join CSUCI's historic affinity celebration for graduating students who identify as Native American, Indigenous American, and/or Indigenous Persons from around the world now residing on Turtle Island (North and South America).

This event will include dinner, dancing, singing, community building, and a blanket ceremony honoring Native & and Indigenous American graduating students from CSUCI. Friends, family, and community members are encouraged to join in celebrating the extraordinary journey of these students and their amazing accomplishments.

#### Lavender Stoling Ceremon (every spring semester in May, before commencement)

In this ceremony, all graduating LGBTQ+ students are invited to recognize the individual(s) who supported them through their academic and personal journey and to be recognized for all they have achieved and contributed to the campus community.

# ChicanX LatinX Spaces and Living-Learning Community:

#### Michele Serrros Living Learning Community

Located in the Santa Rosa Village Building L, Second Floor This community is focused on social justice and equity and is named for the celebrated Chicana author, Michelle Serros, who was from Oxnard, CA. A University Experience Associate (UEA) peer mentor is embedded in each First-Year Seminar, meets with students outside of class in small Dolphin Interest Groups (DIGs) every other week, and works with the faculty and Resident Advisor (RA) in Housing to promote the transition to University life for the LLC cohort.

#### Dolphin Scholar Bell Tower 1530

This center is for first generation college students who are in EOP (Educational Opportunity Program) (enter freshman year) & Dolphin scholar, however it is a safe space for any CI student if they want to take a nap, print, or a place to study.

#### Latine/a/o/X Cultural Center, Bell Tower 1538

Established in the fall of 2023, the Latine/a/o/x Cultural Center provides programming and services that are relevant and responsive to Latine/a/o/x student needs.

#### Michele Serros Permanent Exhibit, Rush Hall



The permanent exhibit features rare memorabilia from the Michele Serros Special Collection housed at the Broome Library. Her skateboard, photos, hot pink high heels and the iconic desk where Oxnard native Michele Serros wrote her way to national renown are among the items now on display in University Hall. The Chicana writer, poet and social commentator died of cancer in 2015 at the age of 48. Because she never forgot where she came from, Serros arranged for CSUCI to receive all of her original manuscripts and personal effects after her death. A mural painted by artist Joe Galarza depict Serros' life story.

- 1. Always attend campus events for free food; Commuters can attend housing events just by showing your ID.

- 3. Parking. Be careful when you have classes at 9 am, 12 pm, 3 pm because parking is hectic. You need to be here at least an hour before your class to get a spot.
- 4. Food Pantry is available to all students with Dolphin ID number in Arroyo Hall next to the rec center & Aliso Hall. You can get free condoms, tampons, and other personal hygiene items, and snacks!
- 5. Free printing at Student Success Center (1518 Bell Tower) and Multicultural Dream Center (1530 Bell Tower) or housing if you are a resident.
- 6. Learn how to get around in Bell Tower. Learn where your class is ahead of time because you might get lost.
- 7. Bring mosquito spray because in the summer they attack.
- 8. Decorate your hydroflask so no one steals it.
- 9. There are police escorts until 9:40 pm and they will give you a ride to your vehicle. Call 805.437.8444
- 10. Enjoy the scenery...but sometimes it smells like fertilizer. It happens.
- 11. It's a judge-free zone to take naps during finals on the library couches. During finals, the library is open 24 hours. On the 3rd floor of Del Norte, there are booths for studying and napping. Recommended taking the elevator in Del Norte.
- 12. Go to the massage chairs in Arroyo Hall and the huevos (egg) in CAPS.
- 13. The Disability Accommodations and Support Services Center (DASS) is a good, quiet place to study.
- 14. Tuesday is \$6 pizza at Pizza Rev; \$2 shoes/\$2 play at Harvey's Bowl; Taco Tuesday almost anywhere; Tuesdays & Sundays \$5-6 movies at all movie theaters in Ventura County (with the exception of Paseo Camarillo Cinemas).
- 15. Take advantage of student discounts for places such as Six Flags, Universal Studios, Legoland, etc.
- 16. Make sure you go to Santa Rosa Island before you graduate!
- 17. Make sure to do a study abroad program before you graduate.

#### **Dolphin Pantry & Hygiene**

The CSU Channel Islands Dolphin Pantry exists to provide immediate food, toiletries and basic necessities at no cost to students in need. The goal of the Dolphin Pantry is to decrease the impact that food and hygiene insecurities have on the academic success of students and to alleviate hunger within our student community. # **Emergency Housing Resources**

#### **Emergency Housing**

The Basic Needs Program seeks to provide support to students experiencing housing insecurity on a short-term basis as they identify long-term housing solutions. CSUCI is able to provide emergency transitional housing accommodations based on space availability.

The following situations may lead to unsafe living situations and the Basic Needs Staff will assess these scenarios on a case-by-case basis to assess if the student is in or will be in an unsafe living situation based on the accessibility of housing:

- Lease not renewed or evicted for nonpayment (unexpectedly);
- The sudden breakup of the relationship left them homeless;
- Homeowner suddenly asks renter to leave so they can move back;
- Termination of job;
- Financial aid did not come through as expected; and/or
- Couch surfing, but have exhausted their welcome.

#### **CSUCI Partners**


CSUCI partners with the Ventura County Transportation Commission (VCTC) to provide bus service directly to and from campus, which allows for convenient accessibility for its riders.

This means alerting the general public and our elected representatives about the need for safe, decent and affordable farm worker housing. Since 2004, House Farm Workers! and its partners have been doing just that. Thanks to these efforts, more than 500 homes have been completed or planned in Ventura County, giving new opportunities and new hope to hundreds of families. They also provide scholarships for students.



#### Farm Worker Immersion Program, Center for Community Engagement

The Farm Worker Immersion Project (FIP) is a program that places students in the community to learn about farmworker rights and immigration issues. The FIP guides students through a first-hand experience of typical farm work life in Ventura County. We visit a local berry farm where students learn about the agricultural business in our county, then work for more than an hour in the field as the farm manager instructs on how to harvest berries. In the afternoon, we will travel to an affordable housing community to speak with farm worker families in their homes. Finally, we will come together for a group reflection. This event has very limited space and requires a mandatory orientation.

#### **MICOP**

Labor Justice efforts are designed to advocate for fair employment practices for farmworkers and to build the capacity and leadership skills of farmworkers to identify, report and resolve employment-based abuses such as discrimination, unpaid overtime, wage theft, on the job sexual harassment, and employer retaliation for demanding fairness in the workplace. MICOP continues to train and organize farmworkers around unjust working conditions and empower them to implement actions that will contribute to better



working conditions, and advocate at the local and state level for stronger enforcement of, and, grower compliance with, the labor laws. MICOP was funded by the National Employment Law Project (NELP) through the California Strategic Enforcement Partnership initiative to engage in strategic enforcement towards creating a culture of compliance in California's economy.



#### Central Coast Alliance United for A Sustainable Economy (CAUSE)

CAUSE is a base-building organization committed to social, economic, and environmental justice for working-class and immigrant communities in California's Central Coast. The Smithsonian offers 10-week summer, fall or spring internships to minority undergraduates and beginning graduate students with a minimum grade point average of 3.0. Qualified students should be majoring in one of the disciplines in which the Smithsonian conducts research. Some of those are: American history, folk culture, anthropology, archeology, linguistics, evolutionary biology, environmental science, mineral

science, planetary science, conservation, linguistics, ethnic studies, aeronautics and geology. Interns work on research or museum-related projects under the supervision of museum staff members. The position is full time, and interns receive a stipend of \$400 per week, with additional travel allowances occasionally offered.

#### **INROADS Intern**

INROADS places talented minority youth in business and industry positions that will prepare them for corporate and community leadership. Participants must maintain a minimum grade point average of 3.0 throughout the program's duration. INROADS combines two to four summers of work experience - depending on the student's year in school - with year-round academic instruction, training and guidance. Students are



assigned a professional mentor and receive a small salary. In addition, many interns receive job offers from their sponsor company upon college graduation. Companies that have sponsored students in the past include: Ernst & Young, IBM, Merrill Lynch, General Motors, General Electric, Lucent Technologies and Boeing.
