


Famed Sports and Olympiad Artist LeRoy Neiman hosted by campus

A luncheon was recently held in the John Spoor Broome Library in honor of renowned artist LeRoy Neiman – best known for his brilliantly colored, stunningly energetic images of sporting events and leisure activities. LeRoy Neiman is probably the most popular living artist in the United States.



Prior to the luncheon, Neiman's visit included a stop at Professor Jack Reilly's painting class in Topanga Hall to meet and observe students before continuing on to view the Bell Tower Courtyard.



During the luncheon former NBA athlete and current CSUCI parent, Tommy Hawkins, recounted stories from his long-time friendship with Neiman before introducing him to invited guests. Neiman then shared

with the audience his art experiences and also answered questions from guests on his perspective of the current art world

Germany's Zeppelin University President visits the campus

President Richard R. Rush introduced Zeppelin University President Stephan A. Jansen during an official visit to commemorate the first anniversary of the international exchange agreement between the two universities, with an official signing ceremony on Feb. 20. The purpose of the agreement is to promote effective and mutually beneficial cooperation and to develop academic and cultural exchange in education, research and other areas.

CSUCI and Zeppelin University will exchange students at both the undergraduate and graduate levels, exchange faculty on a short-term basis, and cooperate on joint research projects and development of curricula. This exchange agreement promotes CSU Channel Islands' mission to graduate students with international perspectives.

Dr. Daniel Lee, Associate Professor of Sociology will be taking 15 CSUCI students to visit Zeppelin University in June. The trip to Germany is a central component of his University 392 course, which involves a comparative analysis of educational institutions in the United States and Germany. The class has been invited to visit the University of Munich, a police academy, an elementary school, a music school, and, of course, Zeppelin University. While in Friedrichshafen, CSUCI students will learn about opportunities to spend a semester studying at the new partner university.

ESRM and English Programs Host Author Dan Koeppel

Environmental Science and Research Management and the English programs will host a presentation by author Dan Koeppel at 6 p.m., Tuesday, March 10 in Aliso Hall 150. This event is free and open to the public.

Koeppel is a dynamic speaker and a frequent guest on national radio programs, including NPR's Fresh Air with Terry Gross. This presentation will feature the author reading from and discussing his latest book, *Banana: the Fate of the Fruit that Changed the World*. The book provides a compelling and thought-provoking look at a fruit whose innocuous and ubiquitous presence on our kitchen counters belies not only its troubled history but also its tenuous future. Koeppel has recently returned from an expedition up the Congo River in research of rare banana breeds for *National Geographic*. Some of Koeppel's books will be available for purchase after his presentation, and the author will be signing copies of his work.

Students plan "Every 15 Minutes" program

Students from the Peer Education Class will present "Every 15 Minutes," an on campus DUI collision simulation, at 1:15 p.m., Tuesday, March 10 as a part of Alcohol Awareness Week. The mock collision will be located on Ventura St. between the Anacapa and Santa Cruz Village housing complexes.

The "Every 15 Minutes" program was conceived fall 2007 in Dr. Alan Pasternak's Peer Education class as a student activism project designed to show students and the campus community the perils of drinking and driving. The event includes a dramatization of extracting a DUI collision victim from a mangled vehicle using the Jaws of Life by the Ventura County Fire Department. A grant by the Office of Traffic Safety was obtained by the Division of Student Affairs to help fund this project for two years. The first simulation took place in March 2008 in front of the Bell Tower building.

7th Annual Women's Recognition Luncheon

Due to weather concerns, the February block party entitled "A Black & White Affair" was held inside the Recreation Center on Feb. 13. But the weather didn't spoil the fun, that's for sure! Students came to the event dressed in their classiest black and white attire and enjoyed dancing to the music of DJ Relyt of Q104.7, socializing and consuming deliciously awesome desserts.

The block party committee is proud of the degree to which its aims are being met through this event which has quickly become a campus tradition. Block parties provide a fun, safe and healthy activity for students to attend on the weekends. In fact, findings from the evaluations show students are more likely to stay on campus during the weekend and report a stronger sense of campus community as a result of attending the block parties. Below you'll see a summary of the findings from the February block party survey, along with some images of students having fun at the event.

171 students returned an event evaluation/survey

- 74.8% of respondents live on campus
- 37.9% of respondents were freshman, 7.1% transfer students, 41.4% continuing students and 13% guests
- 25% of respondents had attended at least three other block parties
- 43.8% of respondents said they would "possibly" stay on campus for the weekend due to a block party while 42.6% said they would "definitely" stay on campus
- 39% of respondents said they "possibly" felt a greater sense of campus community while 52.4% said they "definitely" felt a greater sense of campus community
- 57.7% of respondents said block parties should continue to be held once a month
