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## Sean Anderson awarded President's Award for Innovations in Teaching and Learning

Sean Anderson, Assistant Professor of Environmental Science & Resource Management, has been awarded the inaugural President's Award for Innovations in Teaching and Learning, presented in recognition of an individual who has made unique and significant contributions to the teaching mission of the University.

Applications were judged by a panel of reviewers from off campus. Criteria included: impact on and involvement with students; a scholarly approach to teaching and learning; contributions to undergraduate education in the institution, community and profession; and support from colleagues and students.

Sean was selected for his use of innovative strategies involving technology and service learning projects such as the use of the iTunesU application, podcasts, and lab exercises including conservation role playing. Sean has contributed to the scholarship of teaching and learning through an article titled "Service Learning in Post-Katrina New Orleans" in the volume *Quick Hits for Service Learning: Successful Strategies by Award-Winning Teachers* (M.A. Cooksey & K. T. Olivares, editors, Indiana University Press, 2010).

The award carries with it recognition at CI's Honors Convocation on May 6. In addition, Sean will be nominated by CI for the Carnegie Foundation's U.S. Professors of the Year Award.

## Campus working on Energy Plan



In May 2009, Operations, Planning, & Construction (OP&C) began an extensive campaign to optimize energy use to reduce the utility costs and greenhouse gas emissions. CI has replaced light fixtures and ballasts in Bell Tower, Aliso Hall, Malibu Hall, and University Hall with efficient direct/indirect fixtures that provide improved light quality using less wattage. CI has also expanded its state-of-the art HVAC controls, upgraded the energy management system, pre-programmed cooling and heating units, and computers that automatically power down in computer labs, classrooms, and offices when the machines are idle. These actions have helped reduce our energy use by 16%.

OP&C recently began the next phase of energy efficiency projects, which include upgrades to both the interior and exterior lighting for campus buildings, and the

installation of occupancy sensors that turn off the lights when a classroom or conference room is not in use. Obtaining funding for these projects will be the biggest challenge. Some of the projects listed above require a relatively large capital investment, but capital improvement funds are extremely limited because of the state's financial crisis. OP&C is evaluating several financing options for some of these projects.

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OP&C is planning a web-based dashboard system so that students, faculty, and staff can see the energy use of buildings, foster competition between buildings or areas, and provide the campus a way to display messages aimed at reducing energy use. OP&C plans to launch the dashboard over the next 12-18 months period.

## CI help for Japan

Adhering to the mission statement aspects of international perspectives and the fostering of community, several clubs and organizations at CI have joined together to provide aid to Japan and to bring awareness to the campus.

Student Diana Ballesteros and the Latina Leadership Coalition have lead the charge on CI's efforts. The clubs currently involved include the International Relations Club, Student Government, Psychology Club, Anime Club, Student Programming Board, Triathlon, Male Leadership Alliance, Sailing Club, and Kilusan Pilipino. These groups have collaborated successfully by organizing fundraising events such as a recent event at Johnny Rocket's organized by the Male Leadership Alliance, in which 100% of the proceeds will be used directly for Japan relief. Additionally, \$120 in donations were collected during the Discover CI event.

Along with these efforts, these clubs hope to create several more projects including: a shoe drive, creating bracelets and buttons for donations, a Facebook page for awareness, and tabling. These groups have worked extremely hard to this point but there is still much more to be done.

In addition, applicants could be a descendant of a Bracero and/or AB540 students.

Maribel, whose father has worked over 30 years as a field worker and is now employed with Saticoy Lemon Company, said her educational journey has been a challenge as she struggled to learn English during her high school years. With determination and strength she completed Ventura College and transferred to CI. She has now achieved one of her goals, studying at a university. 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Ana's father worked as a bracero in California and Oregon, never having a chance to attend school. He always encouraged her to take advantage of the opportunities afforded her in the United States. She transferred from Oxnard College and is raising her son while attending CI. She is majoring in Sociology and minoring in Chicana/o Studies and is determined to succeed, assuring that her father's efforts are not made in vain. CI congratulates these two students and wishes them all the best in their future endeavors.

Utilizing the heartbreaking stories of young people across the country who have been pushed to the brink, educators who are burned out and worried that students aren't developing the skills they need, and parents who are trying to do what's best for their kids, "Race to Nowhere" points to the silent



epidemic in our schools: cheating has become commonplace, students have become disengaged, stress-related illness, depression and burnout are rampant, and young people arrive at college and the workplace unprepared and uninspired.
