Author Paul Loeb on campus Sept. 17

Author Paul Rogat Loeb will visit campus and give a talk at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Sept. 17, in Malibu Hall 100. His presentation is free of charge and is open to the campus community and the public.

Loeb is the author of *The Impossible Will Take a Little While: A Citizen's Guide to Hope in a Time of Fear* (Basic Books, 2004, and named the no. 3 political book of that year by the History Channel and the American Book Association); *Soul of a Citizen: Living With Conviction in a Cynical Time* (St Martin's Press 1999, with more than 95,000 copies in print); *Generation at the Crossroads: Apathy and Action on the American Campus* (Rutgers University Press, 1994); *Nuclear Culture*, and *Hope in Hard Times*. He has written on social involvement for several publications including *The New York Times, Washington Post, USA Today, Los Angeles Times, Boston Globe*, and the *International Herald Tribune*. His January 2002 talk at the annual provost's conference of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities inspired what is now a 200-campus American Democracy Project.

Update on current construction related activities

Operations, Planning & Construction has provided the following update on construction activities related to ongoing campus improvements.

Planned activities are as follows for the week of 8/25/08:

Data Center: The power supply and cooling capacity for the Data Center is being upgraded to meet increasing IT capacity demands. The UPS system is also being upgraded and a stand-by electric generator is being added to ensure reliable power supply. The upgrades are also required for the new Supercomputer. Limited noise impact expected from activities inside Ojai Hall.

Smith Decision Center: The Martin V. Smith Center for Integrative Decision-Making is a 4,148-square foot facility that will provide a 60-station state-of-the-art case study classroom and breakout rooms. The facility will be primarily for the Martin V. Smith School of Business and Economics. CMU Wall construction is in progress. Possible dust from masonry work and delivery trucks.

Solano Hall: Solano Hall will include 12 faculty offices, two 24-station classrooms and surge office space for tenants of University Hall and Bell Tower use while these buildings are renovated to provide new HVAC cooling and heating. Potential high noise from water blasting, framing and site work.

Student Union: In 2006, the students passed a referendum to fund the design, construction and operation of a new student center, located in the interim Library building on the Campus Green. The 23,000-square foot building will include a large programmable area for student gathering, food service, lounges, game room and student organization offices. It also includes renovating the "tree house" courtyard for outdoor events and gathering for the entire campus community. Demolition is expected to start this week. Potential high noise and some dust are expected from the demolition activities. The steam line relocation work in the Mall has been completed and the fence will be moved back closer to the building. The entire Mall will be opened shortly. No road closure or parking lot closures anticipated. No utility shutdowns scheduled.

Update on upcoming construction projects

Operations, Planning & Construction has provided the following update on construction projects.

North Hall: The project includes the renovation of 44,000-square feet of the two-story building at the south end of the North Quad and construction of a new 26,000-square-foot three-story building in front of it. The existing building will be renovated to house offices for 115 faculty, faculty support offices, Dean of the Faculty office suite, conference rooms, and other faculty support spaces. The new structure will include a 120-seat lecture hall with state-of-the-art audiovisual equipment, seven classrooms, three computer labs and support spaces on the lower levels. The new third floor will house the office suite for the Vice President for Finance and Administration, Budget, Procurement and Support Services, and Accounting Services. It is anticipated that the groundbreaking for the \$32 million project will be spring 2009 and it will be ready for occupancy in fall 2011.

Entrance Road: The campus is designing a new entrance road that will connect Lewis Road with the campus core on Santa Barbara Avenue. Located on the recently acquired 153 acres of farmland north of the campus, the new four-lane road will become the major entrance to the University and will enter the campus core at the North Quad. The \$24 million project will include a new vehicular bridge crossing over Long Grade Creek and a new pedestrian bridge that will connect future parking off the new road to the campus. Construction is expected to start in June 2009 and be completed a year later.

Nursing Simulation Lab: The new 3,300-square foot Nursing Simulation Lab has been completed on schedule and ready for use beginning with the fall semester.

Infrastructure: Excavation work has begun at the Central Plant.
