Reilly's Exhibition 'New Abstraction' Opens April 26

Jack Reilly's exhibition the "New Abstraction" will open at the Upfront Gallery in Ventura on Saturday, April 26 with an artist reception from 6 to 9 p.m. Upfront Gallery is located at 267 South Laurel Street, 805-340-1448. The exhibition will continue through Saturday, May 31.

The "New Abstraction" series is the quintessential example of Reilly's attention to structure and detail combined with elements of randomness and serendipity. Each painting consists of thousands of brushstrokes, painted in acrylic polymers and metallic pigments on a geometric shaped-canvas structure. Color compositions are emotional, intuitive and theoretical systems arranged in linear formats that interact with the shape of the canvas. The viscosity of Reilly's paint mixture/concoction results in fluid, wet-looking and reflective surfaces. It could be said that these new paintings pay a playful homage to nineteenth-century Pointillism (without including any actual subject matter). However, these densely-polychromed works incorporate a cross-pollination of painting and sculpture. The paintings reappraise and comment on evolving issues that originated in twentieth-century abstract painting and continue into today's contemporary genres. Ultimately, these pieces are poetic objects of contemplation, a continuation of Reilly's explorations into the sensuality of color, luster and surface combined with the dynamic power of line and structure.

OLLI Receives \$1 Million Endowment

The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute of CSUCI has been notified of the award of an endowment for \$1,000,000 from the Bernard Osher Foundation. OLLI-CSUCI joins a select group of institutes at universities that have received this award. The Bernard Osher Foundation has supported Institutes at 119 U.S. universities, but not all have been awarded the endowment. The award is based on a combination of program quality, sustainability, university support, and size of membership.

OLLI-CSUCI was established in fall 2004. Each year to the present, the Bernard Osher Foundation provided support in the amount of \$100,000 per year. Typically, after three years of support, the OLLI must prove its merit for the endowment, or lose continuing support. OLLI-CSUCI, being one of the few that did not spring from an existing lifelong learning institute, was given a fourth year to meet criteria. In fall 2008, OLLI-CSUCI will be given a bridge grant of \$50,000 to sustain it until proceeds from the endowment are available in summer 2009.

OLLI's mission is to provide high quality University classes for persons over 50. There are no grades, tests, or University credits; intellectual stimulation is provided for its own sake. In the past year, OLLI counted 527 student-members, and it continues to grow. Many CSUCI faculty have taught OLLI classes, and all faculty are encouraged to encounter the joy of teaching mature, enthusiastic students who want only enrichment.

CSUCI Receives Grant for Recycling Equipment

CSUCI recently received a \$12,890 grant from the California Department of Conservation to purchase recycling equipment for the University. This grant money was made possible through a partnership with the County of Ventura Waste Management Division. The funding received allowed the purchase of eight parking lot drive-by recycling units and 70 slim recycling units for classrooms.
