Each year, we invest in the graduate education of 30 New Americans—immigrants and children of immigrants—who are poised to make significant contributions to US society, culture or their academic field. Each Fellow receives up to \$90,000 in financial support over two years, and they join a lifelong community of New American Fellows.



CSUCI Courses

Asian Pacific Studies Minor

The minor in Asian-Pacific Studies gives students exposure to the cultures, histories, literatures, philosophies, politics and psychologies related to the study of the Asian-Pacific region. The minor in Asian-Pacific Studies is appropriate for students interested in understanding the diverse perspectives and influences, traditional and modern, emanating from this part of the world.

PSY 344: Psychology and Traditional Asian Thought

This course examines the differences and similarities between the Western practice of psychology and traditional Asian systems of philosophy and religion. Concepts of health, well-being & enlightenment, and pathology will be considered from both Western and Asian viewpoints. Particular attention will be given to Hinduism, Buddhism, Taoism, and depth psychologies. . .

HIST 436 - Psy & Hist Of East Asian Warrior Cultures

Examines the psychological and historical roots of martial arts in Asia. Through selected readings and films, the underpinnings of martial arts psychology in traditional Asian cultures will be explored in a historical context. Characteristics such as duty, enlightenment, honor, loyalty, and discipline will be examined in the context of the individual and group psychology of Asian martial cultures throughout history.

HIST 380 - History of the Pacific Islands

Examines the history of the Pacific from human settlement to the present. Special attention will be paid to cross-cultural encounters, religious conversion, imperialism, and post-colonial realities in the region. The course employs interdisciplinary methods borrowed from anthropology, archaeology, and linguistics. . .

HIST 381 - Traditional East Asia to 1600

Covers the history of East Asia (China, Korea, and Japan) from prehistoric times to roughly 1600 AD. Focus is placed on cultural, institutional, and social developments in civilizations of this region to provide a historical foundation, from the Asian perspective, for understanding the roots of modern globalization.

HIST 382 - Modern East Asia

Examines the rise of East Asia (China, Japan, and Korea) from 1600 to the present. Provides an East Asian perspective on themes of globalization that have shaped modern nation states around the world, including colonization and imperialism, and industrialization. Topics covered include war, revolutions, and governments, as well as philosophies and cultural trends.

HIST 390 - Women and Gender in East Asia

Examines the history of women and gender in East-Asian history from roughly 1000 CE to the modern era. We will examine social and political institutions, as well as cultural practices to examine the evolution of femininity and masculinity and identify common and divergent experiences of gender and sexuality through these civilizations. Topics covered include the family, Confucian norms, love and marriage, wartime gender constructions, and the cultural impact of modernization.

HIST 397 - Pop Culture Along the Pacific Rim: Japan and U.S. in the Modern Age

Examines the connections and parallels between two civilizations along the Pacific Rim through the lens of popular culture in the modern era. Topics covered include: youth culture, countercultures and subcultures, war and reconstruction, mass media, and cultural stereotypes.

ENGL 356 - Lit Of Asia And The Diaspora

Examines the history of women and gender in East-Asian history from roughly 1000 CE to the modern era. We will examine social and political institutions, as well as cultural practices to examine the evolution of femininity and masculinity and identify common and divergent experiences of gender and sexuality through these civilizations.

HIST 395 - Modern Japan

This course studies the social, political, economic, and cultural changes in Japan from the Meiji Restoration to the present.

HIST 396 - East Asia: Then and Now

This course examines the social, political, economic, and cultural foundations in China, Korea, and Japan. Emphasis is given to the profound political, economic, and other transformations taking place in these countries in the twentieth century.

HIST 392 - Modern China

This course explores the social, political, economic, and cultural changes in China from to the rise of the Ch'ing Dynasty to 1949.

BUS 339 - Business in China: Heritage and Change

Examines from a broad historical perspective a variety of institutions and modernization processes of the Chinese financial market, economic environment, and business practices.

HIST 393 - Contemporary China

This course examines the social, political, economic, and cultural developments in China since 1949.

HIST 391 - Traditional China

This course studies the social, political, economic, and cultural traditions in China from ancient times to the end of the Ming Dynasty.

HIST 394 - Traditional Japan

This course studies the social, political, economic, and cultural traditions in Japan from ancient times to the fall of the Tokugawa regime.

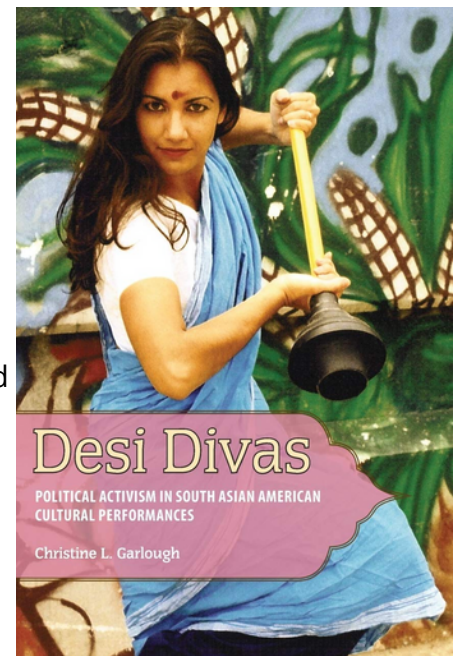

Desi Divas: Activism in South Asian American Cultural Performances is the product of five years of field research with progressive activists associated with the School for Indian Languages and Cultures (SILC), South Asian Americans Leading Together (SAALT), the feminist dance collective Post Natyam, and the grassroots feminist political organization South Asian Sisters. Christine L. Garlough explores how traditional cultural forms may be critically appropriated by marginalized groups and used as rhetorical tools to promote deliberation and debate, spur understanding and connection, broaden political engagement, and advance particular social identities.
