A well-staffed Graduate Studies Center is extremely vital in providing access and support for our students success (from our undergraduates to our graduates). The Graduate Studies Center provides services to all undergraduate, credential and graduate students from all programs at CSUCI. Since the center has become institutionalized, in 2015, the Graduate Studies Center services have seen an increase in demand. Since 2015, the number of student visits & appointments has almost quadrupled. By having an FTE permanent counselor available to keep up with the increasing demand, the center is able to serve and support our students who want to know more about the possibility of graduate school and how to make informed decisions surrounding graduate and professional school programs. Through the graduate school counseling service, our students become better prepared and more informed about graduate school and their postbac options. They also become more engaged students, as they strive to prepare for graduate and professional programs, which leads to higher levels of student retention. As Ernesto stated, "students are encouraged to get involved in undergraduate research and to connect with their faculty on a deeper level." By having a graduate school/MA program counselor available to our students we are opening up and reviewing possibilities with our students and guiding them as they continue to invest in their futures. Students who are better prepared for postbac studies & their careers are setting themselves up for long term success. They are raising the bar for future generations and truly investing in themselves and our community's workforce. At the Graduate Studies Center we see many first generation students who were born and raised in Ventura County and want to find ways to give back to their communities, and as they continue to invest in themselves, they are able to, more fully, give back to their communities.

Through this position, and by having a fully staffed and well funded center, we are also supporting graduate students in their academic pursuits by providing them with a place to help build a sense of community on campus, which can lead to the retention of our graduate students and ultimately yield higher levels of academic and personal success.
