(1) PROVIDE A DESCRIPTION OF THE ACTIVITY

This speaker series focused on the theme of increasing the effectiveness and efficiency of intra-campus communication. Students and invited subject area expert speakers identified and addressed issues relating to barriers to shared understanding of interdepartmental work and priorities. Participants offered considered suggestions for how various constituencies within a campus (i.e., students and faculty in different programs, departments, centers and units) might improve awareness and participation in related efforts.

(2) HOW DID THE ACTIVITY RELATE TO A COURSE(S) AND/OR LEARNING OBJECTIVES?

Participants developed a better understanding for: why creating and executing an effective communications strategy for related projects and disciplinary offerings and goals is a professional skill that requires practice and effort; why under-investing in communication training, planning and practice can be costly to any individual campus organization and the university on the whole; the limits of a 'one person at a time' communications strategies; and the effects of 'noise' in the system of a campus-wide marketplace of ideas.

(3) WHAT DO YOU SEE AS THE STRENGTHS OF THE ACTIVITY?

Feedback on the usefulness of this lecture series was collected in pre and post event participant surveys, immediate formal and informal interviews, and followup surveys and interviews.

Participants indicated increased appreciation for perceived and real barriers to interand intra-campus communication; the kind of resources that are readily available on campus to address them; and the types of practical skills needed to make most effective and efficient use of said resources.

(4) WHAT WOULD YOU SAY ARE/WERE THE ACTIVITY'S WEAKNESSES?

Broader participation in the speaker series (e.g., a more representative mix of the many different stakeholders involved in campus community related communication initiatives) would likely have primed a more sustainable discussion of scalable campus-wide solutions to the communication barriers identified.



(5) HOW WOULD YOU IMPROVE THIS ACTIVITY FOR NEXT TIME?

This activity could be improved via increased student visitation and interaction with representatives of a wider cross-section of the campus community, including more time spent observing communicative behavior in classrooms and meeting rooms.

(6) WHAT DID YOU LEARN FROM THE PROCESS?

There was significant recognition and interest in the type of issues addressed by this project. Students, faculty, administrators and visitors validated the observations of project participants via solicited and unsolicited comments made about communication challenges on campus. There also appears to be a thirst for increased and unforced inter- and intra- disciplinary and administrative interaction and communication opportunities.
