A. ADDRESS THE FOLLOWING QUESTIONS:

(1) PROVIDE A DESCRIPTION OF THE ACTIVITY;

"Indigenous People's Day" brought together and educated the CI Community, K-12 educators, administrators, students and others about the indigenous heritages of the Americas in order to foster cultural proficiency as California moves towards establishing Ethnic Studies programs in K-12 schools, which was inclusive of Indigenous epistemologies and pedagogies.

A number of Indigenous elders from the local Chumash community opened the day with a traditional welcome ceremony and Chumash "Bird Songs". The opening ceremonies was followed by a keynote speaker, who was a representative from the Chumash community (Marcus Lopez), and who shared insight and knowledge of what it means to be Indigenous in modern times. The opening ceremony was followed by a panel discussion by activists/educators involved in the Ethnic Studies Movement from Arizona and California. After the panel discussion there was a hip-hop performance by Jessa Calderon who identifies as Chumash, Tongva, and Mexica. Dr. Cesar Cruz facilitated workshop #2, entitled "Organizing 101". There was an Aztec Dance ceremony that took place outdoors during the lunch hour of which several dance groups participated in. Lead dancers also took time to educate participants about the tradition of Aztec dance. Workshop #3, "Unlocking the Intergenerational Wisdom Within, was also facilitated by Dr. Cesar Cruz and was followed by Workshop #4, entitled "Ixim: A



maiz-Based Philosophy: The roots of In lak 'ech and Panche Be" and "Coyolxauhqui Pedagogy" was presented by Veronica Valadez. All workshops were facilitated by indigenous leaders on subjects such as Indigenous epistemologies, pedagogies, indigenous social movements and grassroots organizing. There was a traditional closing circle to end the day.

Various Indigenous Dance groups from the Santa Barbara, Ventura, and Los Angeles areas participated in the dance ceremony at CI. The presentations/workshops took place indoors, while the performances (Chumash singers and Aztec dancers) took place outdoors.

- (2) HOW DID THE ACTIVITY RELATE TO A COURSE(S) AND/OR LEARNING OBJECTIVES?

 The following are the learning outcomes for students enrolled in CHS 100, CHS 333 and CHS 383:
 - -Evaluate issues and integrate ideas from multiple perspectives and interdisciplinary perspectives.
 - -Cultivate intellect, imagination, sensibility, and sensitivity through the study of culture, languages, social movements and the arts.
 - -Understand social, cultural, and political issues within indigenous communities, as well as human behavior and the principles of social interaction.
 - -Evaluate the ways in which indigenous arts, history, and culture can interact in various contexts
 - -Examine and describe from different perspectives the role of indigenous cultural activists in contemporary culture
 - -Foster tolerance for and sensitivity to different cultures and value systems through the study of indigenous heritages.
 - -Develop and awareness and appreciation of one's indigenous heritage as Native Americans, Mexicans, Chicanas/os, and descendants of indigenous peoples throughout the Americas.

This event functioned as a platform for an important interdisciplinary and multi-cultural dialogue and exchange between the educators, administrators, students, Native singers, dancers, Indigenous elders, artist, workshop facilitators, faculty and community members. It is important to exhibit, learn about, and examine the contributions made by the Indigenous peoples of this continent with respects to their yearning for greater personal integrity as natives, empowerment, and their quest for social justice and historical and cultural recognition. The visiting indigenous elders, leaders, workshop facilitators, artist,

Is LANDS are intellectuals and cultural activists whose work embody medical discourse and visionary ideals of social change. This kind of critical discourse offers our students, faculty, and community members a wonderful opportunity to learn about Indigenous cultures, while learning about the critical role culture and identity plays and can play in Ethnic Studies Programs, social movements, and in understanding the importance of working towards preserving indigenous cultures and traditions.

(3) WHAT DO YOU SEE AS THE STRENGTHS OF THE ACTIVITY?

The strengths of this activity were several. Students from several clubs/organizations came together to help organize and volunteer for this event, which gave them an opportunity to work together and build solidarity amongst themselves. Several community organizations also worked together to make this happen, including XOCHITL, XITO, Ethnic Studies Now, and Raza Studies Now, all of whom work diligently to promote Ethnic Studies in schools across California and Arizona. A number of Indigenous groups were participated in this event, which was absolutley beautiful and empowering. Many relationships were established throughout the day, which was a perfect balance between Indigenous ceremonial traditions and academic workshops that centered around education and community organizing. The event was advertised well which led to more people than expected attending, including a large group of Oxnard High School students. We received very possitive responses and written statements about the event from participants.

- (4) What would you say are/were the activity's weaknesses?
 I'D SAY THE ONLY WEAKNESS WAS HAVING TO ASK FOR MORE TABLES AND CHAIRS LAST MINUTE DUE TO A LARGE NUMBER OF PEOPLE REGISTERING LATE. THANKFULLY, FACILITIES WORKED WITH US AND WE WERE ABLE TO ACCOMMODATE ALL THE EXTRA PEOPLE WHO ATTENDED. THE HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS WERE AN UNEXPECTED ADDITION, BUT I FEEL THAT THEY REALLY CONNECTED WITH THE EVENT AND TEACHERS ESPECIALLY LIKED WHAT THEY WERE LEARNING.
- (5) HOW WOULD YOU IMPROVE THIS ACTIVITY FOR NEXT TIME?

 AND ADMINISTRATORS.

HERITAGES AS WELL AS GIVE THEM TOOLS TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE IN THEIR COMMUNITIES. I ALSO LEARNED THAT HAVING A WORKING COMMITTEE TO HELP WITH ORGANIZING IS VERY IMPORTANT AND HELPFUL.






Cultural Event #2: XOCHITL LA INDIGENOUS PEOPLES DAY

On Friday October 6th, I attended the Indigenous People's Day event that was hosted by XOCHITL LA. The event was held over a period of three days but I was only able to go to the first day that was held at Cal State University Channel Islands in the Grand Salon and the North Quad. This event/program was primarily aimed at both teachers and students especially as the goal of the program is to further educate people on cultural proficiency whilst California is pushing for ethnic studies at the K-12 level. The speaker that I was lucky enough to hear was Dr. Cesar Cruz; I was also there for a panel with speakers: Jose Maldonado, Veronica Valadez, Lupe Carrasco, Jose and Norma Gonzalez. In attendance were people of all ages; there were many student age people as well as older adults. As far as racial background, everyone looked to be some branch of Hispanic, many even identifying as Chicanxs

I was unable to make it to the beginning of the event however I got there around the time of the lunch break and I was able to witness another beautiful Aztec dance and ceremony. The "audience" was even invited to participate in the dance and I thought that showed how accepting the community as a whole is. With every event I go to within the Chicanx community, I always feel welcome and free to express myself without fear of judgment. Also while attending one of Dr. Cesar Cruz's lectures, I actually learned about something called "epigenetic trauma" and this is trauma(s) that is passed from parent to a child or generation to generation until someone finally breaks the chain. Like Patty says, "Your Existence is

Resistance." I also learned about several men and women such as Lucy Parsons, Harriet Tubman, Nelson Mandela, and Lolita Lebron and all of their contributions or relations to the Chicanx culture/lifestyle throughout time. The audience was told to write a letter to themselves from the perspective of one of our "heroes or sheroes"; I chose my mom, as she's the one who stayed home to raise my brother and I and she's had the most impact on my life. In addition to Dr. Cesar Cruz, I was also able to witness a panel of educated professors talking about the successes and failures with trying to implement Ethic Studies programs as well as culturally relevant curriculum at the K-12 level. The panelists were introduced to the audience and then the speaker asked them a few questions concerning their struggles with implementing Ethnic Studies, and especially regarding instances such as the MAS court case and the instance in Tucson where there were lists of books that were banned from school campuses as a way of not supporting the Ethic Studies programs. In the end we passed around sage, exchanged words we felt described the day, and hugged everyone who came and spoke. It was a great experience and I wish I could've gone the last two days.

The event reflects Chicanx culture as it was based around the basic history of the Chicanxs and how we need to be more connected to our indigenous roots. I'm sure that the other days went into a greater depth and expanded the already there information, which further analyses Chicanx culture. This event wasn't only for Chicanxs, but also for those who want to know more about a different culture. That's what I truly love about the people who both create and go to the events; there isn't a "set audience" or set of rules that are intended to discriminate.
