PLEASE EXPLAIN (1) DESCRIPTION OF ACTIVITY; (2) HOW DID THE ACTIVITY RELATE TO A COURSE(S); AND (3) WHAT YOU LEARNED FROM THE PROCESS.

- (1) Mr. Torres Tama's CSUCI residency consisted of the following components:
 - 1. Mr. Torres Tama visited four classes: PA 101 Intro to Performing Arts (37 students), ENGL-PATH 333 Multicultural Drama (13 students), PA 350 Audience and Performance Studies (9 students), ART 102 Multicultural Children's Art (20 students).
 - 2. Mr. Torres Tama gave a free, public, multimedia lecture entitled "Performance Art as a Tool for Social Change" on campus (9/16/2008). Unfortunately, we were unable to require a sign-in at this event, but at least forty students were counted in attendance, as well as three faculty.
 - **3.** Mr. Torres Tama led a performing arts workshop for students (9/17/2008; open to all majors). Twelve students attended all or part of the workshop (evals attached).
 - **4.** Mr. Torres Tama performed his solo piece, "The Cone of Uncertainty: New Orleans after Katrina," on campus (9/18/2008; free to students; \$5 for faculty/staff; \$10 for the public). Eighty-three students, faculty, staff, and public attended (evals attached), and the MWGSC hosted a light reception following the performance.
- (2) The residency activities provided a provocative perspective on multiple cultures and the role of performance art and artists in society. The class visits, lecture, and performance sparked debates among students, some of whom were shocked by Torres Tama's opinions and perspectives that differed from their own, and some of whom felt validated through engaging with a Latino artist. The performance art workshop was particularly valuable for developing a sense of confidence and self-expression for students (both Performing Arts and other majors). The attached emails, letter, and evals give an intriguingly varied account of the residency activities.
- (3) Overall, the residency was valuable and accomplished its goal of exposing students to performance and perspectives they would not easily access otherwise. "The Cone of Uncertainty" performance was unique, thought-provoking, and entertaining, but Mr. Torres Tama seemed overwhelmed and unfocused in a classroom or lecture setting. His perspectives were important, to be sure, but he seemed much less capable and much less effective as an ambassador for performance art than he did when I (Catherine Burriss) first met him last year. In hindsight, I think we would have been better served by asking him to do fewer residency activities, though I cannot honestly see how anyone could have predicted that. Even though I invited him (after a positive experience elsewhere), I would not want to bring him back for another residency until he has more fully developed his classroom techniques.

Dear

Thank you so much for contacting me and speaking your mind. I wish that there had been time yesterday for a more extensive debate and discussion, but we will have that opportunity during the Q&A after the performance on Thursday, as well as on Tuesday in class.

You have every right not to agree with the views presented in any work we read or see for class, and I understand that you took offense at Jose Torres Tama's presentation. We will see and hear about a variety of different viewpoints over the semester, some more and less overtly political, some that directly attack particular segments of society, culture, or politics, for a variety of reasons—most of these will be offensive to someone. It would be a massive distortion of reality to teach a performing arts course covering only politically neutral performances, if such things exist. So while you don't have to agree with any of the perspectives covered in class (some people in class profoundly disagreed with Aristotle, remember), we all do have to agree to disagree civilly, and to think our points through.

Remember, too, that every class in the humanities is a critical thinking class, and performing arts requires perhaps the most intense application of critical thinking. The goal of critical thinking, however, is to *not stop* at being offended, but rather to take that reaction and explore it further, to analyze what caused offense, to interrogate the performance and your reaction, to question, and to build toward possible answers with sound evidence and argument.

So, to your original question: I will not excuse you from attending the performance tomorrow. I think that Mr. Torres Tama, as an artist, needs to hear your perspective, and our class needs to hear it, too—but you cannot hope to speak about, critically process, and especially refute, a performance you have not seen. The answer to offensive or provocative speech is not less speech (or shutting yourself off from it), but more speech—your speech. Every difference of opinion is an opportunity for advancing our collective knowledge and understanding. While I realize that you felt personally attacked, I want to reassure you that the force of Mr. Torres Tama's opinions, forged from his own experiences of being assailed and abandoned in other ways, were not personally directed at you. Nor were you, I'm sure, the only person in the room who disagreed with Mr. Torres Tama. It is vital to the life of our university, our community, our nation that we do not avoid provocative discourses, but rather embrace and engage in difficult conversations. Even more importantly, however angry we are, we must

maintain a civil and reasoned discourse, and also truly listen to the civil and reasoned points made by others.

I am proud of you for having the courage to raise your objections to me, but I will be sorely disappointed if you do not take this opportunity to engage fully in the critical thinking required by the performing arts. I think you should not only attend and comment on "The Cone of Uncertainty: New Orleans after Katrina" but continue to explore more extensively the questions it raises for you in your Live Performance paper. Let me be clear that this is not an exhortation to voice your opinions and nothing more; I'm asking you, as I ask of all students and of myself, to back up opinions with evidence, and to remain open to the evidence presented by others.

I sincerely look forward to the discussions to follow, and thank you once again for contacting me.



Critically acclaimed New Orleans performance artist José Torres Tama has agreed to conduct a four-day residency at CSUCI, as a kick off for Hispanic Heritage month beginning on September 15, 2008.

Mr. Torres Tama has toured nationally/internationally for a dozen years, and is the recent recipient of "Fund for the Arts" Ford Foundation Fellowship awarded by the National Association of Latino Arts and Culture (NALAC). A Louisiana Theater Fellow and an award recipient from the National Endowment for the Arts, he creates performances that thrive on a fusion of spoken word, rituals of fire, conceptual movement, tableau installation, and exaggerated personaecreating spectacles that are visually dynamic and politically charged.

His solos have been presented in Mexico, Canada, Eastern Europe and extensively across the USA at venues such as Performance Space 122 & Theater for the New City in New York, The National Hispanic Cultural Center in Albuquerque, Highways Performance Space in Santa Monica, DiverseWorks in Houston, and the Contemporary Arts Center in New Orleans. In the academy, institutions such as Cornell, Duke, Louisiana State, Dillard, Kalamazoo College, Rutgers and the University of Michigan have presented his provocative solos and academic lectures on performance art as a tool for social change.

His recent post-Katrina commentaries have aired on NPR's "Latino USA" and on WWNO, the local public radio station in New Orleans.

Mr. Torres Tama's CSUCI residency will consist of the following components:

- Mr. Torres Tama visiting classes. Possibilities include: PA 101 Intro to Performing Arts, ENGL-PATH 333 Multicultural Drama, PA 350 Audience and Performance Studies, ESRM 350 Design and Construction of Ecological Restoration Projects.
- 2. Mr. Torres Tama giving a free, public, multimedia lecture entitled "Performance Art as a Tool for Social Change" on campus.
- 3. Mr. Torres Tama leading a performing arts workshop for students (open to all majors).
- 4. Mr. Torres Tama performing his solo piece about the aftermath of hurricane Katrina, "The Cone of Uncertainty," on campus (free to students; \$5 for faculty/staff; \$10 for the public).

2. Relation to IRA to Course Offerings.

Mr. Torres Tama's work integrates and crosses over several disciplines. Here are a some of the courses that could incorporate his residency activities:

3. Activity Assessment.

In addition to the SETEs for each course he visits, we will collect evaluations of the workshop, lecture, and class visits.

4. Activity Budget.

We get all of the residency components mentioned above for a \$5000. honorarium. NOTE: because Mr. Torres Tama will be visiting us as part of a larger west coast trip, including a residency at CSU San Marcos, we save on his travel expenses, which he has agreed to include in his regular honorarium. This amounts to a discount of several hundred dollars.

Other expenses include \$475.24 for four nights at the Courtyard Marriott in Camarillo, at the CSUCI discount rate of \$109/night + 9% tax; \$300 estimated OPC chargeback for setting up for the performance and lecture; and \$150 in printing/copying expenses for posters and programs.

5. Sources of Activity Support.

The MWGSC, Performing Arts, and English Programs, have each agreed to contribute what little they can from their strained 08-09 budgets; they can commit to a combined total of \$225, or \$75 each. Also, we anticipate a low estimate of \$150 will come in from ticket sales to the performance.

UNIVERSITY GLEN LICENSE AGREEMENT

This License Agreement is entered into by and between UNIVERSITY GLEN CORPORATION ("Licensor"), and CSUCI (collectively "Licensee");

WHEREAS, Licensee requests permission and/or access to the premises known as 230 Cathedral Cove #35 Camarillo, CA 93012 ("Suite") on a temporary basis from September 14, 2008 to September 19, 2008, with the intent to be bound by the University Glen community rules and regulations, which document is attached hereto and incorporated by reference as though fully set forth herein:

The Parties hereby agree to the following terms:

The term of this License commences <u>September 14, 2008</u> (the "commencement date"), and ends on <u>September 19, 2008</u>. If Licensor is unable to give Licensee possession of the Suite on the commencement date for reasons beyond Licensors reasonable control, Licensor shall not be liable therefore and the License shall terminate.

Licensee acknowledges that he/she has inspected the premises and acknowledges that the Suite is in good condition and that Licensee is satisfied in all respects with the condition. Licensee understands and agrees that he/she is responsible for reimbursing Licensor for all damages caused to the Suite minus normal wear and tear.

The daily rental rate for the Suite is \$95.00, payable in advance of Licensee's move-in. Total amount due is \$475.00.

No alterations or additions of any kind shall be made to the Suite without Licensor's prior written consent. This prohibition includes, but is not necessarily limited to painting, wallpapering, installing bookcases, cupboards, shelves, shutters, doors or other fixtures, drilling into or driving nails into or otherwise disfiguring or defacing any part of the Premises. Licensee shall be liable to Licensor for its reasonable costs and expenses incurred in so restoring the Premises, including but not limited to the costs and expenses of any work performed by Licensor's employees.

This License shall be revocable by Licensor with or without cause with 24-hour written Notice to Licensee. Upon expiration or termination of this License, Licensee shall surrender the Suite to Licensor vacant of all occupants and in the condition in which it was received. Licensee shall also return all keys to Licensor or pay Licensor's then applicable charge for non-returned keys. With respect to any personal property remaining on the Suite after the expiration or termination of this License, Licensor may, in addition to all other rights of Licensor under applicable law, with or without notice to Licensee: (a) remove same from the Premises and store it at the Licensee's risk and expense; (b) sell such personal property at private or public sale and apply proceeds to any storage costs and expenses of sale incurred by Licensor and to any amounts

remaining unpaid by Licensee under this License; or (c) otherwise dispose of such personal property in any manner Licensor deems appropriate, under the circumstances, in the good faith exercise of its sole discretion.

Licensee hereby expressly agrees to indemnify, defend and hold harmless Licensor from and against any and all claims, damages and expenses, including reasonable attorneys fees, allegedly resulting from bodily injury to any person and/or damage to any property on account of, or relating to, or arising from Licensees negligence; failure to maintain Suite in a clean and safe condition; violation of any statutory provisions, including Civil Code Section 1941.2; and/or violation of the License or any provision therein.

Landlord shall have all rights to enter the Suite provided by law, including Civil Code Section 1954, which provides, without limitation, (a) in case of emergency, (b) to make necessary or agreed repairs, decorations, alterations or improvements, supply necessary or agreed services, or exhibit the dwelling unit to prospective or actual purchasers, mortgagees, tenants, workmen or contractors, (c) when the tenant has abandoned or surrendered the Premises, or (d) pursuant to court order. If Licensee requests Licensor to enter the Suite for any purpose, then such request shall be deemed to satisfy any obligation of Licensor to give reasonable notice of Licensor's intent to enter during normal business hours.

Licensee agrees not to disturb or annoy, or permit any occupant, or any guest or other invitee to disturb or annoy any resident of University Glen whether by noise, cooking or other odors, offensive conduct, or otherwise, and not to commit or permit any other nuisance or waste, in or about the Suite. Licensee further covenants and agrees: (a) to comply with all the applicable laws, rules, regulations and ordinances of governmental authorities, (b) not to commit or permit any unlawful act in or about the Suite, and not to commit any act or permit any condition to exist which will cause the fire insurance or the building in which the Suite are located to be canceled or the insurance premium to be increased, (c) not to keep or permit to be kept in or about the Suite any animal or pet., and (d) to comply with all of the Community Guidelines (Rules and Regulations), as may be modified by the Licensor from time to time.

Pursuant to Section 290.46 of the Penal Code, information about specified registered sex offenders is made available to the public *via* an Internet Web site maintained by the Department of Justice at www.meganslaw.ca.gov. Depending on an offender's criminal history, this information will include either the address at which the offender resides or the community of residence and ZIP Code in which he or she resides.

The Agreement constitutes a legally binding contract enforceable by law. Execution by the parties' authorized representatives acknowledges full acceptance of all the terms and conditions contained herein by the parties.

If any provision of this Agreement is determined to be invalid or unenforceable as written, it shall be deemed automatically modified to the extent necessary to make it valid and enforceable but otherwise shall be severable from the remaining provisions of this Agreement, which shall remain in full force and effect

If an action is brought for the enforcement of the terms of this License, including the recovery of rent or other moneys due under this Agreement or by reason of a breach of any covenant herein or for the recovery of possession of said Suite, or to compel the performance of anything agreed to be done by Licensee, or to recover for damages to said property, or to enjoin any act contrary to the provisions hereof, Licensee will pay Licensor all reasonable fees and costs in connection herewith.

The signatories to this Agreement hereby represent and warrant that they are authorized to execute this Agreement on behalf of the entities named.

No waiver of any provision of this Agreement shall constitute a waiver of any other provision, nor shall such waiver constitute a continuing waiver. If any portion of this Agreement shall be deemed by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unenforceable, the remaining portions shall be valid and enforceable.

The terms of this Agreement shall be interpreted as though each of the parties hereto participated equally in drafting the language thereof, without regard to whether any one party actually drafted or prepared this Agreement or any part of it.

Each party to this Agreement agrees, represents, and warrants that in executing this document it does so with full knowledge of the rights it may have in respect to the other parties to this Agreement, and that it has received, or had the opportunity to receive, independent legal advice as to these rights and the consequences of this Agreement.

The parties hereto represent and acknowledge that in executing this Agreement they do not rely upon and have not relied upon any representation or statement made by the other party or by the agents, attorneys or representatives of the other party with regard to the subject matter of this Agreement, or its basis, or the effects of this Agreement other than those representations specifically set forth in this written document.

This Agreement sets forth the entire agreement between the parties. No supplement, modification, or amendment of this Agreement shall be binding unless executed in writing by both parties.

COMMUNITY GUIDELINES - ALL LESSEES

(Rules and Regulations)

University Glen is a community that closely resembles any small town in the United States. Like any other small community, University Glen has rules and regulations that serve to guide your actions and which protect and respect your rights as well as those of your neighbors. These guidelines have to do with the use of public spaces in the community, the safety and comfort of all residents and their guests and visitors, the allocation and use of the parking areas, and the general concept of sharing the resources of the community.

The following rules and regulations are an integral part of the lease to which they are attached. Failure to comply with any rule is a default giving the landlord the option to use the remedies specified in the lease. The landlord reserves the right to rescind, add to, or otherwise change the rules and regulations from time to time as Landlord, in its discretion, deems necessary for the care and cleanliness of University Glen, the maintenance of good order, and the safety, comfort and convenience of all residents.

1. PETS

No Pets are allowed at University Glen without the express written consent of University Glen. This includes the pets of your guest.

2. <u>COURTYARDS AND ALL OTHER COMMON AREAS</u>

You are not allowed to disturb, or annoy, or permit any occupant, or any guest or other invitee to disturb or annoy any lessee of University Glen. Additionally, trash, recyclables, hoses, bicycles, barbeque grills, basketball hoops, plants, trees, and any other items stored in the common area are in violation of the fire code. Any items visible from outside your apartment must stored in a neat and orderly condition.

LANDSCAPE

Soil in flowerbeds or shrub beds shall not be removed, tampered with or disturbed in any manner. Residents may not landscape or garden in common and public areas.

4. CHILDREN

Children may play and have games and other activities in recreation areas that are provided for such purposes. Wading pools, basketball courts, sand boxes, swing sets, or other large equipment are not allowed at University Glen except those provided by Management. Children 14 years of age or younger are not allowed in elevators without adult supervision. Play areas, recreation areas and common areas are not supervised. Children play at their own risk in these areas and must be accompanied by an adult if 14 years of age or younger.

5. FURNITURE

Discarded furniture is to be removed from the property by the resident and not left in the building, on the grounds or in the trash dumpsters. Anything left by lessee for University Glen to remove, furniture, carpeting, trash, etc., will be

charged to lessee for complete cost of removal in accordance with California State laws.

6. NOISE

Please remember not to disturb or annoy others with stereos, TV's and musical equipment at any hour. We encourage residents to respect the rights of others.

7. WINDOW COVERINGS

Window coverings are provided and required on all windows. Written consent must be obtained from the landlord before installing shades, window blinds, or window guards. No foil, film, decals or posters are allowed on windows.

8. LOCKS AND DOORS

Altering of locks and installation of knockers, mailboxes, door bells, chains or other attachments on the doors of your home is prohibited without prior approval of University Glen Management.

9. FLOORS

On the hardwood floors of the Town Center apartments, use only wax intended for wood floors. Do not use water on wood flooring; it can cause buckling of the floor.

10. PLUMBING

Please do not dispose of improper articles in plumbing fixtures. The cost of damage resulting from misuse shall be paid by lessee. Washer or dryer hook-up is prohibited (each home includes a full size washer and dryer.) Water purifying systems are not allowed.

11. ADDING ROOMMATES

Roommate additions must be approved **prior** to roommate taking occupancy. Any addition must appear on the lease as a lessee or occupant and, if the new roommate is replacing another lessee, a signed Roommate Notice To Vacate & Security Deposit Release by all current lessee(s) is required. Lessees wishing to add-on to a lease agreement must pay applicable application fees and qualify with the other roommates. More information about adding a roommate may be obtained by calling the leasing office.

12. SOLICITING

University Glen does not allow or permit the distribution of any printed materials anywhere in University Glen. Do not solicit or engage in door-to-door selling, canvassing, or proselytizing.

13. LOCKOUTS

For the safety of your home and/or garage, it is the policy of University Glen Corporation that after hours on-call staff are not available to unlock your home and/or garage if you've been locked out. Calls fraudulently made to the emergency maintenance pager to get maintenance staff to your home after-hours will be charged for the overtime wages paid to those employees. It is therefore crucial that as a resident of our community, you take note of the following

suggestions: 1) Make sure that all appropriate household members have their own key/remote control. 2) Before leaving your home, make sure that you have your key/remote control with you. 3) Take appropriate measures to ensure that each member of your household is educated on personal safety and well-being. In the unfortunate circumstance that you should be locked out of your home or garage during office hours, identity verification will be required before you can be let into your home.

14. PARKING

Parking within University Glen is allowed by permit only. Town Center parking lots are for Town Center residents only; unless, visiting a retail establishment. When visiting the Town Center retail establishments you are required to park in the appropriate parking spaces designated for retail establishment visiting spaces only.

On or before move in, a Parking Registration Application and Parking Addendum must be completed. All vehicles that park within University Glen must be registered with the Leasing Office. CSUCI Parking Services is informed of all vehicle registrations within University Glen and strictly enforces all parking rules and regulations. A current driver's license and vehicle registration is required. Each individual Lessee and/or licensed occupant with a vehicle will be given a maximum of one resident parking sticker, and each household will be issued two visitor parking permits. Visitors are required to display a visitor parking pass and park on the street. Guest Parking Passes may not be used at anytime in the University Glen apartment parking lots. If a permit is lost, there is a \$25.00 replacement fee. If a resident fails to turn in their permits with their keys when moving out, they will be charged \$25.00 for each resident parking permit or visitor parking permit that is not returned. Additional temporary Guest parking permits are available to residents who request them and provide their visitors' vehicle information to the leasing office at least 72 hours in advance. Vehicles not displaying the proper permit are subject to towing or citation at the owner's expense.

15. COMPLIANCE WITH RULES

It is the responsibility of Lessee to fully comply with the rules and regulations and ensure compliance by their occupants, guests, visitors, contractors, and other invitees.


