1. Brief Activity Description. Describe the activity and its relationship to the educational objectives of the students' program or major.

The Center for Community for Community Engagement has an exciting opportunity to host nationally recognized author and speaker Paul Loeb on September 17, 2008. Paul Loeb has spent over thirty years researching and writing about citizen responsibility and empowerment--asking what makes some people choose lives of social commitment, while others abstain. He has written five widely praised books including, The Impossible Will Take a Little While, Soul of a Citizen, and Generation at the Crossroads, lectured at 400 colleges and universities around the country-including Harvard, Stanford, Dartmouth, Chicago, Michigan, MIT, Yale, Cornell, Duke, Wisconsin, and Columbia--and been a lead speaker at numerous conferences. His January 2002 talk to the annual provost's conference of the American Association of State Colleges & Universities inspired the Association's American Democracy Project, now involving 200 campuses, including California State University Channel Islands. Loeb's campus visit will serve two purposes, curricular and co-curricular:

1). He will conduct up to four classroom workshops for University 110 students speaking about the barriers to citizen involvement; why students hesitate to act on America's most critical public issues, and how they can get past their hesitations to effectively take a stand, as well as public issues in the news. His classroom visit will also include ways students in service projects can balance their desires to help in concrete, one-on-one ways, while addressing root social structures that cause problems like hunger, illiteracy, and homelessness. To prepare University 110 students for his visit Loeb's book, *Soul of a Citizen*, will be required course reading.

Recently University 110 courses have been redesigned to integrate the University mission. Loeb's themes of civic involvement support elements of the University's mission statement and its commitment to engage students in their local and global communities.

2). His visit will also be woven into "Be a Part From the Start," a ten week event dedicated to the development of the "whole student" by featuring activities to help students connect their educational experiences with their career goals and a healthy and fulfilling lifestyle. As a part of this celebration the Center for Community Engagement will celebrate Citizenship Week, September 15-19, with events designed to promote the concepts of social justice, leadership, political action, and service.

On September 17, 2008 Loeb will also give a lecture to the campus and community at large that will combine the themes of his last three books, The Impossible Will Take a Little While, Soul of a Citizen, and Generation at the Crossroads. Loeb's talk will focus on themes of hope and

persistence and on how ordinary citizens can make their voices heard and actions count. In addition, he will speak about how people get involved in larger community issues and what stops them from getting involved; how they burn out in exhaustion or maintain their commitment for the long haul; how involvement can give them a sense of connection and purpose rare in purely personal life. Attendance at his presentation will be an assignment for students enrolled in University 110 courses. Students will also be asked to write a reflection paper about his presentation. Attendance for this event will also be open to the public.

Paul Loeb's visit and themes of social and civic responsibility and engagement reflect elements of the University mission, the Center for Community Engagement's mission and characteristics of a CSUCI graduates; dedicated to maintaining the principles of intellectual honesty, democracy, and social justice, and to participating in human society and the natural world as socially responsible individual citizens. His classroom workshop and campus lecture will provide curricular and co-curricular activities; offering rich exposure to the topic of citizen involvement and empowerment in bringing about social change.
