1. **Brief Activity Description.** Describe the activity and its relationship to the educational objectives of the students' program or major.

Model UN events are academic conferences for students that provide students with a unique opportunity to develop an understanding of the complexity of specific issue-areas in global politics. Benefits for students include skill development in policy research, conflict analysis, thinking from different perspectives, negotiation, and public speaking. Students are also able to interact with a diverse range of students from around the region. These are all qualities that benefit any major, as well as more specifically related political science majors, communications majors and global studies minors. However, we plan to encourage interdisciplinarity in the team, and as part of the application and selection process will choose a team from a cross section of majors. We now have a team as well as a new student club (International Relations Club). Participating students will be able to get three credits for POLS 490.

This application is for funding to take students to two Model UN events in the spring, one in northern California: the UC Berkeley Conference on March 5-8 and the second in southern California: Western Model UN in Santa Barbara on April. The budget below is estimated for fifteen students.

2. **Relation to IRA to Course Offerings.** All IRAs must be integrally related to the formal instructional offerings of the University and must be associated with scheduled credit courses. Please list all classes that relate to the program proposed.

Model UN is integrally related to several courses: POLS 490 which is a special topics course about the Model UN offered during Spring 2010. Students who participate this spring will be in that course too. POLS 329, International Law and Organizations, is offered most academic years, including Spring 2010. In addition, the subject matter for all Model UN conferences is germane to POLS 103, Introduction to International Relations (offered every semester). Further, it is related to the subject matter in COMM 320, Persuasion & Argumentation, COMM340 Conflict Management and Mediation and COMM 430 Political Communication.

3. Activity Assessment. Describe the assessment process and measures that the program will use to determine if it has attained its educational goals. Please note a report will be due at the end of the semester.

As noted, the primary educational goals for participation in Model UN are skill development in policy research, conflict analysis, thinking from different perspectives, negotiation, and public speaking. Students are graded for the courses based on their exhibition of these skills.

The main areas for which funding is needed are registration fees and hotel costs. Students will pay for their own transportation and food.



PLEASE EXPLAIN (1) DESCRIPTION OF ACTIVITY; (2) HOW DID THE ACTIVITY RELATE TO A COURSE(S); AND (3) WHAT YOU LEARNED FROM THE PROCESS.

- 1) A group of 14 students attended the WestMUN and the Far West MUN conferences to discuss, debate, and negotiate several global issues. Our students did very well. They were all very engaged, with one winning an award at WestMUN (Casey Penn).
- 2) This relates to work in the political communications and international relations courses on campus. Students were required to write position papers about their issues (6 across the semester), as well as country background papers (2 during the semester).
- 3) We had multiple debrief/discussion sessions during the conference and at the end. The students learned immensely about the multiple issues in their committees, and also about the procedures used during such negotiations. We left feeling that Model UN participation is essential to our efforts to work toward global engagement of our students.

Reflection Paper

I learned so much about myself this semester while taking this class. It has been the best and most personally challenging experience throughout my four years at CSUCI. I not only learned about world affairs and international policy, but I also was pushed to my limits, both academically and personally throughout the two conferences. I have come away from this experience invigorated and inspired with a newfound confidence in new situations.

When I came into the class, I was apprehensive and insecure when dealing with anything about international affairs. I was afraid to speak at the conferences because I did not want to be called out or say something that was not in line with my country's policy. I was unsure of how to approach an International Criminal Court mock trial, considering that I had never even heard of the ICC before this class. I did not know what GA, GA3, IAEA, etc. meant and felt like I was in a foreign country when initially researching for the conferences. I did more research than I had ever done in my life, and read about issues like human trafficking that I had never really understood.

Despite my unsure feelings and insecurities in regards to this topic, I knew I could overcome that barrier. I worked very hard and at times pushed other assignments for other classes off so I could research for the next conference. I now understand why the United Nations is so important and how seemingly small issues impact the entire world and can be the subject of heated debate. I learned that relations between countries are a true hindrance to successful consensus about issues, like in the High Level Event. I have a better understanding of

the dynamics between nations and the impact that those dynamics have on world affairs. By the end of the San Francisco conference, I lead the writing of a resolution, had given a speech about Jamaica's policy on women in power and decision making positions, and became a leader within the General Assembly. I made new friends and made great memories. I pushed myself physically beyond what I thought were my limits. I learned to function on very little sleep and to think outside the box to help gain consensus among countries. I look at the world differently after this class. My perceptions and opinions are forever changed.

This class was one of the most difficult and most rewarding experiences of my life.

Thank you for giving me the opportunity to represent CSUCI at these conferences. I learned more than I expected to learn throughout this semester. I wish I was not graduating so I could take the class again in the fall. You have enabled me to open my eyes to the world and increased my awareness of international issues. Thank you.

Model United Nations Reflection

Overall, I would have to say that Model United Nations class is an invaluable and irreplaceable experience. No other class, I think, can produce the same kind of knowledge or encounters that MUN can. Its unique set-up allows kinds of exploration I didn't know could be encompassed in one college course.

I must admit that the research I was required to do this semester was difficult. At the beginning of the semester, I was not quite as familiar with the United Nations official website as I would have liked to been. It was tough to navigate the site at first, but I eventually found most of the research that I needed from there. But figuring out the UN site was also fun. I was able to explore it for myself, and that allowed me to gain a self-taught, more personal knowledge of how the United Nations worked. The assigned book was very helpful in this, also. However, I had countries for both conferences whose information was difficult to find. Statements from government officials were almost impossible to locate, and if I could find some, it was hopeless to sort through them to find those pertaining to my particular committees and topics. For this, I wish I had some guidance or required group time to find that information that would have made my policy statements solid. Also, the policy statements were not hard to write once I got down the formula, but I regret that they were not better due to the lack of information I found.

The Santa Barbra and San Francisco conferences were fun, as well as stressful. But I couldn't help but notice they were two very different experiences. The Santa Barbra conference

was much, much smaller, and therefore much more intimate. There was opportunity for in-depth discussion and debate, and everybody in the room was able to know the specific viewpoint and opinion of all of the represented nations. There was time and few people enough to talk with everyone in attempt to create super resolutions, and no one person could take control of the situation; everyone had an equal role and say. In contrast, the San Francisco conference was an opportunity to work with and observe many people. Instead of working with everybody, most of the time resolutions were made within regional blocs, which is a very different dynamic. Also, the situation called for a few people to take leadership roles to create resolutions, speak for their groups, and otherwise keep the conference moving. I allowed those stronger delegates, such as the ones who had been to New York, fill those positions. In the end, both conferences required and help me develop communication and negotiating skills.

More than learning about the United Nations and the countries I delegated for, I was able to acquire skills that I can take to all other aspects of my life. First, I was able to find confidence within me. At the beginning of the first conference, I was terrified. But as it went through, I felt more courage to speak and defend my country's position. This confidence and will carried through to the second conference, and continued to grow throughout. I am also no longer as much of a push-over. I was increasingly better at defending and arguing for my countries' positions, even while negotiating and compromising, as the conferences continued. Now I think I can do the same for my personal opinions in other things in life. The most important and hardest lesson for me was how to deal with people. I learned how to be patient and listen to others and be diplomatic to all, even those whose personalities I truly despised.

Model United Nations Reflection

Coming into this class I was extremely nervous and unsure what the class would be like. I had only vaguely heard of MUN in high school because of the team at my high school, but, I never really took the time to bother with finding out what it was because I really had no interest in politics. However, I am a declared Political Science major and can't get enough of it.

Since I love public speaking and politics, I knew Model UN would be the ultimate resume builder, especially since I have aspirations of possibly working within the UN someday.

At first, I was confused and felt nervous and stressed because of the requirements of the class. I had no idea how to write an effective policy statement or resolution. I tried very hard to write the best papers I could, but I still felt as if I didn't fully understand the task. I figured it would be best to listen to what experienced Model UNer's had to say. "Nothing will make sense until you actually experience it"—and how right they were.

The first conference in Santa Barbara turned out to be one of the best educational experiences I have ever encountered. Even though students complained that it was not strict enough and the setting felt informal, I thoroughly enjoyed that very portion of it. Because this conference was my very first, I had no expectations, except that it would be challenging. Once our committee sessions began, I jumped into the conversation and found myself constantly being added to the speaker's list and working in unmoderated caucus's writing resolutions with various countries. For a first time experience, it was great to feel relaxed in session, so I could easily express opinions without feeling degraded or looked down upon or even intimidated by other students. At the end of the conference, I was given an

invitation to attend the diplomat's banquet because I had been considered one of the top delegate's in my committee.

As the San Francisco conference rolled around, I became nervous once again, but equally excited. I knew this conference would be tough, but, I didn't expect it to be anything like it turned out. The committee sessions were extremely long, the entire parliamentary set-up was different, the student's representing their countries were well prepared, and there was constant bickering and arguing. By the end of the day, I was so tired; I couldn't wait to leave the committee room. I wondered why I disliked this conference so much. Then, I realized it was because I was afraid to speak up and become a part of the discussion taking place. Once I understood that although these people around me were well prepared and intelligent, I was too. I had adequately prepared information and knew I had things to say, the only thing stopping me was myself. After this, I opened up, overcame the fear and the drama, and embraced the conference for what it was; hands on learning experience. The last two days were much better, and I was actually sad to leave.

Thanks to these experiences I hope to return as a more experienced and confident Model UN student in the fall. Now that I have two conferences under my belt, I am ready to actively participate so I may be one step closer to achieving my goal of working in the United Nations.

Model United Nations

One of the jobs of the United Nations is to conquer the division between the North and South. This was surely something to remember while trying to come up with quick detailed solutions to the world's most evident problems in a five day time span.

This was something I had to take into consideration being that I had presented a nation that was not fully developed like much of the Northern countries. During Unmoderated caucus I would go around to those dominant countries and ask how this working paper would benefit those who do not have money, the resources, or maybe even government to implement such plans. I think it was easier for me to work in this conference as opposed to the other one in Santa Barbara because it was bigger; and I knew who to work with. It was fun to gather up all of the African Union over to the corner and go over clause by clause trying to see if this is something that would benefit most if not all of the African Voting Bloc.

I think it was easier for me to speak to those who had a common ground with my country. This way when I explained things those nations would understand where my country had been coming from and could give me their own examples of such instances. The country of Ethiopia really did a great job in bringing together the African Union; it was fun working with her. She was actually really inspiring me to try to work harder. However my problem is confronting people; I just get so scared that a person is going to call me out on something that I did not research well enough. I can focus more on being a leader in committee sessions right away instead of only after the second or third day. Overall, I really enjoyed these two conferences and wish we could do more. MUN is great experience for students interested in international relations and country cooperation and I would recommend anyone to join the team.
