1. **Brief Activity Description.** Describe the activity and its relationship to the educational objectives of the students' program or major.

This proposal seeks funds for a UNIV 392 course titled "Global Cities: Madrid". This is the study abroad component of a course that I will be teaching under the Global Studies minor, namely GLST 435 Global Cities: Madrid (Spain). This is the first time that this course will be taught at Channel Islands and the original idea of this Global Studies course is to have faculty from different disciplines to teach this course on a recurrent basis with focus on different global cities. This course will meet the study abroad requirement for students minoring in Global Studies. It will also be counted as an upper division elective for Spanish majors and minors.

The course will take place in Madrid, Spain, from January 9 to January 19, 2012. It is designed to reinforce and provide first-hand experience about the ideas and concepts developed in the GLST 435 course. This course focuses on Madrid as an example of a Global City. In this course, students will learn the cultural, historical, economical, environmental, political and social factors that make Madrid a global city, with strong links with Europe, Latin American, and North Africa.

Every day, students will be engaged in activities that include visits to official institutions (such as the Congress or the National Environmental Office), interviews with government officials (such as police inspectors, the Dean of the History Department at the Universidad Complutense de Madrid), visits to museums and historical sites, etc. (for a detailed description of academic activities, see syllabus attached).

Upon return to the US, students will have two weeks to prepare a poster presentation based on a topic of their choice. These posters will be shown during international week and there will be a formal presentation to the campus community as well.

2. **Relation to IRA to Course Offerings.** All IRAs must be integrally related to the formal instructional offerings of the University and must be associated with scheduled credit courses. Please list all classes that relate to the program proposed.

This UNIV 392 course is designed to be the continuation of the GLST 435 Global Cities course that will be taught in the Fall 2011. This class is an upper division elective for the Global Studies minor. This course is cross-listed with a number of disciplines, including Sociology, History, Political Science, Economy and ESRM. Students from all these disciplines are welcome to enroll in the course. This UNIV 392 course will satisfy the study abroad requirement of the Global Studies minor. In addition, since the course takes place in Madrid (Spain), students majoring or minoring in Spanish will be able to transfer this course as an upper division elective.

Students will design poster presentations that will be exhibited in the library during international week. Catalog description

UNI 392: International Experience: Global Cities - Madrid.

Provides an opportunity for students to earn credit for travel and study in a country outside the US, where the student is immersed in a foreign culture. This specific course focuses on Madrid as an example of a Global City with important cultural, historical, economical and social links with Europe, Latin American and North Africa. Taught in Spanish and in English.

Prerequisites: Satisfactory completion of GLST 435, 2 semesters of Spanish language instruction (or intermediate level of the language) and consent of instructor.

Participants

A maximum of 15 CSUCI students will take part on this UNIV 392 International Experience Course. Students will have to submit an application package to the instructor including an

unofficial transcript, a letter of intent, and two faculty recommendation letters. The selection of qualified participants will adhere to the following priority guidelines:

- 1) CSUCI Global Studies minors who have already passed the course GLST 435 (Global Cities).
- 2) CSUCI Global Studies minors who want to fulfill their study abroad requirement.
- 3) CSUCI Spanish majors and minors.
- 4) CSUCI students in any discipline
- 5) CSUCI faculty, staff, and outside community members.

Student learning objectives

The following is a partial list of student learning outcomes. Upon completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- a) describe the factors that make a "global city";
- b) explain Madrid's historical circumstances that shaped it into a global city;
- c) identify Madrid's social groups and communities;
- d) identify Madrid's environmental issues and challenges;
- e) describe Spain's political institutions and Madrid's role as a political force, both nationally and internationally;
- f) explain Madrid's economic role in the international market;
- g) describe Madrid's cultural treasures;
- h) conduct original research via both traditional and nontraditional means, including on the ground, field experiences in Madrid;
- i) analyze issues and challenges that will continue to shape Madrid's global policies.

Course content

Most of the content of the course will have been covered in the course GLST 435: Global Cities. This international experience course is designed to provide firsthand experience on the social, historical, cultural, economic, political, and environmental factors that make Madrid a global city.

Prior to departure, there will three orientation sessions that will specify the academic requirements for the course, safety and security issues, logistic arrangements, etc.

During the course, the group will gather in the morning for an hour to discuss the topic of the day and the activities organized related to that issue. These activities include visits to official institutions, interviews with government officials, visits to museums and historical sites, etc. (for a detailed description of academic activities, see calendar below).

Upon return to the US, students will have two weeks to prepare a poster presentation based on a topic of their choice. These posters will be shown during international week and there will be a formal presentation to the campus community.

Grading procedures

This course emphasizes the exploration of the global issues of a Spanish modern city: Madrid. The final grade is built by the day to day effort of the student in completing all the activities designed for this course. A description of these activities follows:

- 1) Journal: You should plan to make a journal entry every day with a minimum length of 250 words per entry (or the equivalent of one typewritten 8 ½ by 11 page). In these entries, you should reflect on what you learn every day, with a special emphasis on the topic of the day. Also, you should think on how these experiences inform your research topic. The last entry should sum up what you've learned about your issue, and about Madrid, that you couldn't have known without spending time there. Write an entry everyday so that you don't forget your experiences. The time will go quickly and will be hard to reconstruct them when you return!
- 2) 1 Research Project and Presentation: Prior to departure, each student will choose a topic of investigation. During this course, students will have to find information and resources regarding their topics of investigation. This information will be the base of a poster presentation during CSUCI International Week. These posters will be also exhibited in the Library during that week. Students will have two weeks after their return to the U.S. to complete theses posters.
- 3) Participation: All students must attend all planned excursions and special events. We expect that all students will be good CI representatives. Serious disruptive behavior may result in expulsion from the program and the student will be responsible for the cost of his/her return home. 25% of the final grade is based on attendance, participating in planned tours and cultural events, and overall good and responsible behavior.

HOUSING

The group will stay in a 2 or 3 star hotel in downtown Madrid. Students will share double rooms. January 9-19 is low season in the capital of Spain, right after the Winter Festivities. Finding a hotel will not represent a problem and prices will be the lowest in the year. Some of possible hotels where the group can stay include:

MEALS

Breakfast will be provided at the hotel, where we will hold our morning discussions. Students will be responsible for their lunches and dinners. Students will be given free time during those times to find the food that they want to eat. Madrid has thousands of restaurants and cafeterias, offering all different varieties of food at affordable prices.

LOCAL TRANSPORTATION

The group will be using public transportation while in Madrid. Public transportation is very well-organized in Madrid. There is a very efficient transportation net that includes buses, subway, short distance trains and long distance trains. Reservations can be easily made on the internet to secure seat availability. Using local transportation will be part of the experience in Madrid.

SAFETY/SECURITY

Madrid is a relatively safe city. While most of Spain has a moderate rate of crime and most of the estimated one million U.S. citizen tourists have trouble-free visits to Spain each year, street crimes against tourists occur in the principal tourist areas. Madrid reports incidents of pick-pocketing, mugging, and occasional violent attacks, some of which require the victim to seek medical attention.

In order to mitigate these unlikely problems, students will be advised to stay together and watch for each other. Also, they will be asked not to carry any valuables with them. They will be recommended to use their phones in case of emergency. Students will have a card with important phone numbers, including the cell phone of the instructor and emergency numbers. All these aspects of safety and security will be discussed at length in all three pre-departure orientations.

HEALTH EMERGENCIES

Students will have medical insurance during the study abroad experience. Madrid has a multitude of doctors and medical facilities readily available in case of a medical problem or emergency. The instructor of this course was the Resident Director of the CSU Study Abroad Program in 2007-08 and is very familiar with the medical facilities available in Madrid.
