Describe the activity and its relationship to the educational objectives of the students' program or major. 15 CI students will travel to Paris for two weeks and then to Florence for two weeks to study drawing, painting, art history and languages at the Paris American Academy in Paris, France and the Centro Fiorenza, Florence, Italy. The Paris and Florence institutions will provide housing, classrooms, and studios. Language instruction will be taught by teachers from the French and Italian schools. Art course instruction will be team taught by two CI Professors. Field trips to museums and historical landmarks in and around Paris and Florence will also be a significant aspect of this course.
