1. **Brief Activity Description.** Describe the activity and its relationship to the educational objectives of the students' program or major.

(1) Field Trip to Santa Cruz Island

<u>Fall 2012</u>: The purpose of the trip is to introduce students in Biol 433 (Ecology and the Environment) to the ecology of the Channel Islands. Students will participate in an all day field trip to Prisoners Harbor, Santa Cruz which is part of the Channel Islands National Park. Transportation to the island will be provided by Island Packers, the official National Parks carrier. Students will spend several hours on the island.

(2) Field trip to Western Foundation of Vertebrate Zoology

<u>Fall 2012 and Spring 2013</u>. The purpose of the trip is the introduce Biol 433 and Biol 451 (Ornithology) students to the Western Foundation of Vertebrate Zoology in Camarillo. The WFVZ is both a natural history collection specializing in eggs and nests of birds from around the world, and a research and education institution dedicated to bird conservation.

(3) Field Trip to Bitter Creek National Wildlife Refuge.

Spring 2013. The Bitter Creek National Wildlife Refuge is located in the southwestern San Joaquin Valley foothills of Kern County, California. Elevations on the refuge range from 1,600 to 4,680 feet and is bisected by the notable San Andreas Fault. This 14,097-acre refuge protects the Federally Endangered California condor foraging and roosting habitat. It is the site where the last wild female condor was trapped in 1986. Today, reintroduced condors feed and roost on the refuge.

The purpose of the trip would be to experience wild condors first-hand. Biol 451 (Ornithology) students would gain an understanding and a tremendous amount of insight into the recovery efforts for this species. Students would meet with U.S. Fish and Wildlife personnel to learn how this species has been brought back from the brink of extinction.

2. **Relation to IRA to Course Offerings.** All IRAs must be integrally related to the formal instructional offerings of the University and must be associated with scheduled credit courses. Please list all classes that relate to the program proposed.

Fall 2012: Biol 433 (Ecology and the Environment) investigates the ecological characteristics of natural ecosystems and the basic effects of human society upon those systems. In addition, plant and animal distribution patterns in relation to past and present physical and biotic factors are covered. Issues of resource management, population, food production, global environmental problems are also emphasized to explore future directions. Field trips to local ecosystems are an integral and essential component to further student learning. This field trip will address several student learning outcomes:

- (a) understand the history of the Channel Islands
- (b) familiarize students with endemic, native and exotic species
- (c) evaluate the methods currently being used to restore the island
- (d) quantify the effectiveness of the different management strategies adopted and consider their controversial nature.
- (e) observe and consider the distinct plant and animal communities and how they relate to island biogeography
- (f) appreciate the islands as a repository for the biodiversity of this region

The Channel Islands field trip is an integral component of Biol 433 (Ecology and the Environment). The trip includes a crossing of the Santa Barbara Channel with stops made enroute to look for, and identify, the marine fauna of this region. Once on the island, the students will be taken on a guided hike by an experienced naturalist. They will be introduced to the unique aspects of the ecology of the many plant communities, and identifying dominant, endemic, and indicator plant species to be found on the island.

The hike terminates at a lookout that provides a vantage point from which the island system can be surveyed. From this point students will gain a perspective of the entire ecosystem, encompassing the flora and fauna of the island, the intertidal region and the marine systems of the surrounding channels. We will spend time in this area discussing the organization and the interconnected nature of the entire system and the importance of the land – sea interface.

Fall 2012 and Spring 2013 Western Foundation Of Vertebrate Zoology

The egg collection of the WFVZ the largest in North America, and likely in the world. In addition they have a large collection of nests, study skins and hundreds of mounted bird specimens. The purpose of the trip is to allow students to examine eggs, nests and study skins of birds. This will enable them to:

- (a) appreciate the value of these collections for bird conservation
- (b) discuss some of the extraordinary adaptations birds have evolved
- (c) gain an understanding of evolution and ecology of birds
- (d) view some of the more unusual birds from around the world
- (e) collect data for later analysis in the lab

Spring 2013 Bitter Creek National Wildlife Refuge field trip

The field trip will address several Student Learning Outcomes:

- (a) observe endangered condors in the wild
- (b) appreciate the natural history of this species
- (c) discuss the Condor Recovery program administered by the USFWS
- (d) appreciate the habitat needs of this species
- (e) understand the basic principles of Restoration Ecology
- (f) observe the geologic features of the condor habitat
- Activity Assessment. Describe the assessment process and measures that the
 program will use to determine if it has attained its educational goals. Please note
 a report will be due at the end of the semester.

Students will be required to complete a lab report which will cover the student learning outcomes as stated above
