This is a Guest Lecture/Performance Series for the PAMU 333 "Varieties of Musical Experience" course. Dr. KaunFen Liu's "Music Appreciation" class will also attend these concerts. These performances are open to all CI students, faculty, and staff. Our C.I. students love seeing these live concerts. It is very important for the University students to experience these diverse styles of music being performed in person by high caliber professional musicians. For that reason, I have invited two exciting musical ensembles to perform for our class during the course of the semester. We will encourage the students to ask questions of the performers, and thus contribute to their understanding of the performance process. As a part of this experience, my class will write a concert review paper about these performances.

For an exciting concert, which is sure to please lots of students on campus, I have invited the fabulous Latin music/world music ensemble "Incendio" to perform for us. "Incendio" features exciting Latin guitar flourishes, combined with energetic percussion, and Middle Eastern musical influences. Truly a multicultural experience! All our guitar students will want to make sure to catch this show!

My other plan for this semester is to bring back the Modul8 Saxophone Quartet to C.I. Modul8 performed in Malibu Hall back in Spring of 2012, and the response from the students was overwhelmingly positive. The musicians in Modul8 have agreed to stay on campus all day, so I will also have them perform for my Jazz in America class, and for my Music In History class. The Modul8 Quartet plays a wide variety of classical, jazz, and pop music. The group will program appropriate music for each of my three classes
