CCACA is an educational ceramic sculpture event in Davis, CA. This conference is from April 26 –
April 28th, 2013. Students will interact with well-respected artists in the ceramic field within an
intimate setting. Ceramic sculptor, Robert Arneson was instrumental in defining a new direction
for ceramic art within the northern California art scene. His influence can be experienced by
students and be inspired by other nationally recognized ceramic art talents throughout Davis.

Students will be exposed to demonstrations, lectures, and shows. Additionally, students will partake in a student organized exhibition as one of the 40 college shows and gallery shows that will be occurring during that time. Some of the gallery exhibitions include:

- John Natsoulas Gallery's 23rd annual 30 Ceramic Sculptors
- The Artery's California Clay Competition
- The Davis Art Center
- The Pence Gallery
- Ceramics from UC Davis's permanent collection, featuring Robert Arneson's masterpiece, The Palace at 9 a.m.

We plan to work with Admissions to provide handouts and information about CSUCI Art Department at the show, which will serve as advertisement for possible and interested future students.

2. Classes that will be directly related to this field trip include: Art 207, Art 329, Art 421, Art311, Art321 and Capstone.

This opportunity is open to all ceramic and sculpture students, although we anticipate mostly students enrolled in 329 and 421. By this time in the pursuit of knowledge in the ceramic arts, it is imperative for students to find direction in their artwork and to articulate their intentions as an artist. Projects are deliberately open to throwing, handbuilding, moldmaking, or a combination of 2 or all 3 of these. Exhibiting those pieces at Davis will provide a special opportunity for students to engage with a ceramics specific audience and community.

Capstone students will assist in exhibition details and learn how to organize a show.

3. Students enrolled in Art329 and Art421 will prepare careful documentation of the conference and post information on class website. They will also be required to share their experiences to the other art students in an oral presentation.
