#### Variety of Musical Experience Concert/Lecture Series.

This concert/demonstration/lecture series will provide our Performing Arts students the opportunity to hear top professional musicians from Los Angeles performing interesting varieties of music (with International musical roots). I have planned for the popular all-women trio VOCO to return to CI to present their very unique blend of Appalachian folk music, Eastern European music, vaudeville, and classical music. These women sing with exquisite harmonies, play a variety of instruments, and also add body percussion to the proceedings. VOCO leads the audience through an experiential call and response where everyone gets to sing along and create some new vocal sounds. This group sings in English, Bulgarian, and other languages.

I also would like to stage a return visit by the great Latin guitar & percussion group "Durand & Carbe". This group was very well received by our students in a previous semester. These artists have successfully places many of their songs on movies, television shows, and video games. Students can learn much about the music business by these working pro musician/composers.

This concert series will allow students to see and hear unusual musical styles that are not so commonly encountered. Students will have the opportunity to interact with our guests and ask questions about musical performance techniques. They may also ask career related questions of our guests.

Dependent upon scheduling, we will endeavor to have our musical guests to perform at multiple time slots during their day on campus, thus bringing the music to a greater number of students.

FOR ALL RELATED COURSES - each concert will take place on the dates listed on the first page. All PA students will be encouraged to attend all of our IRA events.

PA 101 - Introduction to the Performing Arts: obviously the opportunity for our PA students to watch skilled professional performers ply their craft onstage is a great learning experience.

PAMU 100 - Music Appreciation: for the music appreciation students, nothing will enhance their appreciation of the art form than seeing high quality music up close and personal.

PAMU 333 - Varieties of Music: this proposal is written for this course, which delves into many types of music. The International character of the musical groups that I invite for this course are directly linked into some of the varieties of music that we are studying.

PAMU - 200 History of Rock: the guitar and vocal performances of our guests will directly relate to those skills which are also so important in the rock music world. Durand and Carbe play a few classic rock tunes, revamped into Latin music styles.

PAMU 261 - Music Theory: Our musical guests have extensive knowledge of the theoretical and practical components of music. Students will see musical theory put into real world applications in these performances. Students may ask theoretical questions of our guests.

PAMU 336 - Jazz In America: improvisation, which is such a key component of jazz, will also be on display during these two performances. I also teach Jazz in America, and so will prep my students for the improvisational features that they may expect to see during these concerts.

PAMU 202 – Group Guitar: both of my guest bands will feature very brilliant musicians playing guitar and other stringed instruments. It goes without saying that all of our guitar students of every skill level need to attend these events.

PAMU 337 - Music In History: VOCO performs some amazing adaptations of Bela Bartok's music, who is one of the main composers who we study in this course that I teach. VOCO also performs some Appalachian folk music, which we also study. Durand/Carbe plays Latin world music, and world music is also studied in this class.

PAMU 308 - University Orchestra: our young musicians in the University Orch. need to see proficient musicians perform at every opportunity. So much can be learned from watching great musicians ply their craft. The opportunity to ask questions of seasoned professionals is also very important for our young musicians on campus.

PAMU 307 - University Chorus: the brilliant vocal harmonies of VOCO will be perfect for our University singers to learn about and experience. The leader of VOCO leads a nice audience participation singing experience during their show.

PAMU 109 & 309 Private Lessons (all instruments): just like the Orchestra, our young musicians in need to see professional musicians perform at every opportunity. So much can be learned from watching great musicians ply their craft. The opportunity to ask questions of seasoned professionals is also very important for our young musicians on campus.

PA 499 - Capstone: as our PA student get ready to graduate and enter the professional world, what could be better than to see and interact with our musical guests, who are all very established in the pro music scene of LA/Hollywood?

PA 491 – Entertainment Industry Lectures: We are bringing top industry professionals to campus for our students, so they can observe, experience, and interact with out guests. My concert series will be an excellent supplement to this course's content.

Apply the principles of performance in dance, music, or theater.

Reflect on how personal experience informs understanding of theory and practice

Examine how gender, culture and ethnicity influence personal performance. (Our guests include an all women's band, and Latino musicians)

# PLEASE EXPLAIN (1) DESCRIPTION OF ACTIVITY; (2) HOW DID THE ACTIVITY RELATE TO A COURSE(S); AND (3) WHAT YOU LEARNED FROM THE PROCESS.

- 1.) This concert featured the exceptional vocal and instrumental talents of Moira Smiley and VOCO. Two different CSUCI classes were assembled to hear the dazzling music that VOCO provided. My PAMU 333 "Varieties of Musical Experience" class was present, along with Dr. KuanFen Liu's PAMU 100 "Music Appreciation" class. KaunFen's class always joins forces with my class whenever I bring musical events to the campus. Other CSUCI students and staff also attended this concert.
- 2.) My PAMU 333 course examines a wide variety of music from different cultures, and VOCO provided a great performance/presentation to match the goals of our class. During this performance, Ms. Smiley and VOCO demonstrated folk music from Eastern Europe and the Appalachian Mts., and they also performed some of their original songs. Some of the songs were sung in Bulgarian and Hungarian languages, which was certainly a new experience for our CI students! Ms. Smiley led the audience through a very interesting call and response singing exercise. By singing in response to Moira, our students got to actually experience singing some of the different sounds and nuances that are found in Eastern European music. Exotic instruments such as accordion, banjo, ukulele, and ethnic percussion were used during the performance. All of those elements contributed towards our students' musical knowledge, as they happily absorbed new combinations of sounds that they had never encountered before. At one point, Ms. Smiley played recordings of Bela Bartok's folk inspired compositions, and then Moira demonstrated her arrangements of those same songs. It was quite an informative and interesting presentation.

At various points during the presentation, C.I. students were able to ask our guest musicians questions about their musical influences, their musical training, and general questions about the performers' lives in the music world. Our students learned that our women performers in VOCO also sing operatic styles, and they have been recorded on several major motion picture soundtracks. Especially for our Performing Arts students, it is very important to have these interactions with the professional musicians who visit campus by means of the IRA funded concerts.

My class was required to write an in-depth concert report paper about this event.

This writing project was one of several assignments that served to address the University's writing goals for this class. In writing the concert report, the students sharpen their writing skills, practice their newly acquired musical terminology, and have an opportunity to share their thoughts and reactions to the concert. My students stated that seeing these bands perform on campus is essential to their understanding of the content and objectives of this course.

Excerpts from the students' concert reports are attached to this document.

3.) I learned that Moira Smiley and VOCO are very experienced at these kinds of presentations, and that our students really enjoyed the performance. VOCO did an excellent job of presenting information about their music to the students. Our students reacted very positively to this musical experience. I would be happy to bring this ensemble back to our campus for another concert at some future date.

These 9am concert times are not convenient for all students and faculty, but we must present the concerts at the time that the classes are scheduled for. I estimate that we had about 75 people in attendance for this concert. All those people in attendance seemed to enjoy the concert very much.

### EXCERPT of Student Reviews of VOCO concert. 10/18/12 at Malibu Hall.

The performance given by "Moira Smiley and Voco" was inspirational and refreshing. There were three female vocalists who appeared to be down to earth and dressed in casual wear. To me, their appearance suited them well as they explained the importance of voice and performing to be that of communication, sharing, and telling stories, rather than glamorous performances and fame. Moira- vocals, banjo, and body percussion, led the trio. The two other members were April Guthrie- vocals, cello, and body percussion, and Pilar Diaz- vocals, ukulele, and body percussion. The trio worked well together in a capella pieces as well as the arrangements with instrumentation. Overall, I was very impressed by their performance and their general point of view on music, method, and intentions. I greatly appreciated this performance, and couldn't have thought of a better way to start my day.

Moira Smiley explained that the VOCO's music is inspired by folk songs, and by the stories that these songs told. The folk songs she was most influenced by came from Eastern Europe, and the Appalachian

mountain area of the United States. She interpreted these traditional songs that she felt a connection to, and created her own spin with them with the group VOCO. I understand Moira Smiley's vision, and feel, for creating her arrangements. VOCO is an amazing musical group.

I feel this concert and all of the other IRA funded live in class concerts were a very worthwhile use of IRA funds for learning and understanding the music. I felt that these live concerts in class helped me greatly in my learning, and were very useful. It is enjoyable and a great way to experience the music firsthand. This is also a fantastic way to understand different music perspectives. Especially for this class, PAMU 333, The Varieties of the Musical Experience.

Have you ever had a moment where a musical piece moved you in such a way that made you feel inexpressible joy, peace, or wonder? These are some of the feelings that I felt when I heard the brilliantly written songs and captivating voices of VOCO. Moira Smiley, April Guthrie, and Pilar Díaz formed a perfect blend of harmonies and awed me with their vocal and instrumental versatility in the different genres of music they presented to us (Eastern European music and Appalachian/American folksongs).

I thought it was wonderful how Moira started the concert off by interacting with her audience. She involved her audience by demonstrating a call and response technique. I could not believe the control she had over her voice! She had incredible pitch and a distinctive and wholesome quality to her voice.

VOCO is a group that I will always remember, especially because I bought two of their CDs! I enjoyed their harmonies, creative arrangements, orchestrations, and passion for their music. This is a band that I would truly enjoy seeing again. I want to become a part of their mailing list so I can go see them when they play locally. I definitely feel this concert was a good use of IRA funds. Not only is IRA funded live concerts crucial to the content of our course, but it also gives students a chance to learn more about different types of music and become more educated on cultures around the world. Additionally, the women in this concert inspired me to want to pursue a career in music. They made me hopeful that I can use my creativity to touch others with music.

The diverse singing trio VOCO was incredibly enjoyable. I was immediately impressed with the lead singer, Moira Smiley, who started the performance off with an a capella song she wrote about living in California. She was so relaxed and her voice was so clear. As she sang she looked directly into my eyes for a moment and I was totally absorbed in her song. Moira then led a call and response singing exercise

with us. This was perfect, because at nine in the morning we all needed something to wake us up and thoroughly engage us. I ended up having a lot of fun participating.

I admire how Moira talked about the goal of her music being that she wanted to be an honest storyteller, because that is also how I feel about the music that I write. She says she is not focused on fame, but instead she is focused on the spirit of the music. This is evident in the songs they performed. There was definitely a free spirit-folk vibe to all of Voco's songs.

I was very impressed with how they sang in other languages. They had a Bulgarian folk song medley that they sang in Bulgarian flawlessly, and then they even sang another song in Hungarian.

Voco was a really entertaining group, and I could feel their heart behind the music. The way that they used their voices, bodies, and instruments in such a creative way was truly a work of art that left me very impressed.

A group about the voice and the beautiful things the voice can do, VOCO is made up of people from all over the country. The music featured by VOCO is specifically folk music of the Eastern United States (such as from the Appalachian Mountains) and the countries of Eastern Europe. The three women that performed for us were Moira, April, and Pilar. The vocal harmonies in the songs were absolutely breathtaking, creating a work of art within a few simple chords. In addition to using their voices to make music, these women played the accordion, cello, banjo, ukulele, and various forms of percussion.

The performance by these three amazingly talented women began with a solo, "I Live in California." Sung by the leader of the group, Moira Smiley, the song set the tone for the rest of the concert. A simple melody with lyrics about the land of California, the folk song helped me leave my thoughts and worries at the door, and focus on the music. Moira then led a "call and response" that allowed us as an audience to test our vocal chords, bending our voice into strange sounds. This exercise was great, not only because it foreshadowed the Bulgarian songs that were to come, but also because it woke us up and got us to participate in the music. Following the interactive exercise was an American folk song called, "Bring in the Water, Sylvie."

These live performances made possible by the school are definitely necessary. Professors can discuss and lecture about music till the sun burns out, but the only way for students to truly learn about music is to hear it performed live. These concerts not only allow students to experience the music in person, but they also allow students to talk to the performers and ask questions, learning what it takes to be a professional musician. I hope the school keeps funding the concerts, because I will definitely attend them even after I've completed my music courses—I bought CDs from both bands I've seen, because I crave and enjoy new music. VOCO has been my favorite in-class performance so far, mainly because I like folk music already and, as a singer, appreciated the vocal harmony parts. I would see them again any day, because I know I can expect something new and refreshing from them each time.

On Thursday, October 18, 2012, I had the pleasure of attending a vocal performance of a group by the name of "VOCO". Coming into this performance I really did not have any pre-conceived expectations or ideas of what the concert would be like. However, this performance by far exceeded any ideas that I may have had before listening to these women sing. I absolutely enjoyed this concert and am so happy that I had the privilege of listening to the incredible voices that make up this group.

Overall I feel that this concert was very beneficial to the learning goals and expectations of this course. The name of our class is "Varieties of Musical Experience" and there really is no better way of "experiencing" music than to actually see it live and in person. Sure, we can learn about the different varieties of music while in the classroom, but being able to study a real-life performance of what we are learning about is ultimately going to be immensely more beneficial. Also, this group in particular incorporated a lot of learning into their performance. For example, Moira did a "call and repeat" like exercise where we were able to see some of the different sounds that we could make with our voices and showed some really great illustrations of how she used arranging in her own music. Moira even played us three different arrangements of one song in order for us to see the how arranging works. This was especially beneficial for someone like me who does not have a lot of musical background. Altogether this concert was such a memorable experience and I am really glad that we were able to see VOCO perform.

Last Thursday our class once again had the pleasure of seeing some fine musicians, who went by the name of VOCO. # PLEASE EXPLAIN (1) DESCRIPTION OF ACTIVITY; (2) HOW DID THE ACTIVITY RELATE TO A COURSE(S); AND (3) WHAT YOU LEARNED FROM THE PROCESS.

- 1.) This concert featured the world music ensemble "Quarteto Nuevo". This multicultural music ensemble performed for two CSUCI courses: my PAMU 333 "Varieties of Musical Experience" class, and Dr. KuanFen Liu's PAMU 100 "Music Appreciation" class. KaunFen's class always joins forces with my class when I bring musical events to the campus. Other CSUCI students also attended this concert.
- 2.) My PAMU 333 course examines a wide variety of music from different cultures, so Quarteto Nuevo was a perfect fit for the goals of our class. During this performance, our students were able to see and hear musical instruments from North India, South America, Central America, and Europe. The musical styles presented in this concert were a fusion of Indian music, Classical music, American jazz music, and folkloric influences from Mexico. All of my students said that this concert allowed them to watch and hear some musical instruments that they had never seen before. Quarteto Nuevo's very unique blend of multicultural musical styles was a new experience for each student.

At various points during the presentation, C.I. students were able to ask our guest musicians questions about their musical influences, their exotic instruments, their musical training, and general questions about the performers' lives in the music world. Especially for our Performing Arts students, it is very important to have these interactions with the professional musicians who visit campus by means of the IRA funded concerts.

My class was required to write an in-depth concert report paper about this event. This writing project was one of several assignments that served to address the University's writing goals for this class. In writing the concert report, the students sharpen their writing skills, practice their newly acquired musical terminology, and have an opportunity to share their thoughts and reactions to the concert. My students stated that seeing these bands perform on campus really is essential to their understanding of the content and objectives of this course.

3.) I learned that our students reacted quite favorably to Quarteto Nuevo's music.

Because this band is so unique, their sounds provided a brand new musical experience for everyone involved. I would be happy to bring this ensemble back to our campus for another concert at some future date. Then another set of music was performed at 4:30 for the PAMU/HIST 337 class. Students and faculty from other classes and other departments also dropped in for these concerts. Very little musical repertoire was repeated during the day, so each concert was unique. The music related to these courses because the performances included the many styles of music that these classes have been studying during the semester. ### Modul8 Sax Quartet - 3/28/2013 - I.R.A. Concerts Compilation of Student comments

### (Modul8 performed at three different class times on this day.)

The jazz concert featuring four saxophone musicians as a quartet was a new and interesting experience. Though many people have seen and heard jazz bands, both large and small, it was unique to see a saxophone quartet in person. In contrast to other bands that featured rhythm section instruments such as the bass, drums and the guitar, it is very new to see four saxophones work together, each with different sounds, to make the music clear, harmonious, and entertaining. Each saxophone player was aware of the others' roles and actions, and they all played very professionally in knowing the music and what each song and its changes entailed.

Almost as interesting as watching the four musicians play, was the information they shared about themselves and their past experiences while playing various events. As the one musician shared about his past jobs and experiences, the audience was able to get a look at what the life of an on-tour musician really is like. Instead of the glamour that is attributed to musician's lives in Hollywood, it seems that going on tour is difficult, with cramped living spaces and primarily the separation from family for months at a time. Also, the idea of corporate bands as still prominent in today's society was an interesting in which I failed to recognize that corporations still hire big bands for entertainment for special occasions.

The musicians also highlighted the need for dedication and practice. The four musicians explained how they practice and learn the songs on their own time and then come together to practice in order to work on harmony and transition. They also emphasized that in today's music industry it is a must to be able to follow directions and to thoroughly know what you are playing which requires a lot of personal dedication and time to learn songs and arrangements.

Overall, the saxophone quartet was an exciting and entertaining experience in contrast to the more traditional small jazz bands that have been featured.

Over all, this was the best thing I have ever heard at nine in the morning, and I hope that the University will continue to provide its students with so many wonderful experiences during their four short years here. I know that for me activities such as these will be some of the fondest memories that will keep me smiling whenever I think of my time here at Channel Islands.

The vibe that was given off by the sax quartet was a jazzy, yet structured style of music. The quartet members seemed to be extremely comfortable playing with the other members, and they seemed to stay in touch with the melodies of all songs. Even during the small amount of improvisation that was performed, the musicians understood the melody and the timing of the songs very well.

First off, I must say that Professor Marsh is an incredibly talented sax player. The show was absolutely awesome. Now that I got that out of the way, the sax quartet was

The last song that was played was an original composition written by Professor Marsh. The baritone saxophone began playing at the beginning and set the mood of how the piece would continue. Overall, I really enjoyed the performance. I liked the vibe from every musician because they were willing to answer our questions with maximum effort. They wanted to teach us about their instrument and inform us about the music they were playing. It was impressive how the musicians played together and blended so well since they don't perform together often. It proved that practice and love for the music makes a fun-filled show. The performance had an intimate feeling, and it helped me connect more with the music. It was a perfect way for us to listen to some live music that was relevant to what we're learning in class.

We fortunate enough to enjoy a saxophone quartet concert. The saxophone quartet was called Modul8 and included our professor Marsh and three of his musical colleagues.

One song that was performed was again arranged from one of the members from the quartet. One song they performed was The Beach Boys' "God Only Knows". This is one of my favorite Beach Boys songs, so I was very excited to hear it.

The musicians also played Bach's "Fugue in G Minor". This fugue seemed to be very complicated; however was much more enjoyable than the pipe organ fugue that we heard earlier in class. This fugue seemed to be more enjoyable and less disjointed then the fugue we heard in class. This fugue started with one saxophone playing the subject, and then one by one each saxophone would enter from the beginning of the subject.

The concert ended with Professor's original song that he had written in his college days. The song was written at ASU in Tempe, Arizona and was called "A Tempo in Tempe". This song was originally written for only one saxophone, so our teacher eventually re-orchestrated it for a saxophone quartet. This song seemed to have a call and response with the other saxophones and also seemed to have qualities of a fugue in some aspects of the song. This song was also upbeat, happy, and also had a lot of flourishes. This song also had motive development since there were parts of the song that had bigger or thinner texture.

Therefore this concert was very interesting because we got to hear and learn more about the saxophone. We got to learn about four different types of saxophones and how each of the saxophones sounds different. We also got to hear how the saxophone could play both newer and older pieces of music. Finally, we had the opportunity to hear original tunes that we may have never had to chance to hear.

Even after being in the PAMU 333 course for three months I have a long way to go when it comes to actually knowing how to appreciate music to its fullest. Before taking this course I had no idea that there was more than one version of a saxophone or flute, and other instruments. I lack the refinement of music appreciation and understanding that some of my peers have. Even so I know what I like and learn to appreciate what I hear, and what I heard in our second in class concert was incredible.

Andante et Scherzo was the second song, composed by Eugene Bozza a French composer. The song started off at a slow walking tempo, with the tenor sax acting as a cello, followed by the soprano sax then finally simultaneously joined by the baritone and alto saxophones. In the middle of the composition it is the Baritone sax that received a short solo, when it ended the other three saxophones joined in at a crescendo. The second part of this piece was livelier and faster than the first part, it gave me the sense of butterflies dancing to a flute. Though all the instruments were four different saxophones, I still cannot believe that.

"The Cascades" is a song composed and played by Scott Joplin back in 1900 was the fourth tune of the series. To my untrained ears it sounded a lot like a carnival ride tune, but it suddenly morphed into a lively cartoonish themed song. All throughout the song it went back and forth between carnival ride and cartoon sounds. It was an interesting song to hear always morphing between two imageries and going from loud to lively, soft and slow.

Song number five was a more classical piece, *Fugue in C minor*, composed by Johan Sebastian Bach. It was a Fugue with a five measure melody which consisted of constantly playing parts leaving very little room for breathing.

The seventh song was one of Beethoven's more classical pieces, titled *String Quartet in G major/Opus 18 No. 2.* Over all this was one of my favorite pieces from the entire short concert.

The members of the Modul8 Sax Quartet did an excellent job of stopping to explain their performances and what went into each piece of music. Modul8 provided a comprehensive and well-rounded range of different selections for this performance. The ease with which they switched between so many different music styles and eras was extremely impressive.

While listening, I noticed that they played songs from multiple genres that we have already covered in class. This made it more enjoyable to here certain songs, that of Bach, Beethoven, Scott Joplin and many more.

During their performance they played a variety of genres. Overall the concert was very pleasing to watch and to listen to. Not many people can say they have seen a saxophone quartet, and Modul 8 did a fantastic job with the pieces they chose. It was very helpful, being in the varieties class as well, because it allowed us to understand the style of the song while they were playing, and they covered a total of 6 different genres. Having the variety of music live was pleasant to hear, rather than just listening to the music online.
