Brief Activity Description	Spring 2016, I will be teaching a new course I developed entitled, Reproductive Health and Justice in the Chicana/o Community. A major component of this course will be students organizing various components to this one-day symposium which will bring students and community together to discuss current issues related to Reproductive Justice and Birth work. Students will work to gather oral histories about Xicana-Indigenous

experiences of childbirth and will produce a culturally relevant birthing calendar to be translated in Spanish and Mixteco (with the help of the Mixteco Indigena Community Organizing Project). This calendar will be a tool provided to the community at the summit. The one-day symposium will bring together experts from multiple disciplines to examine the various issues being faced by women in their childbearing years and create the means for continued communication and exchange of ideas between community, students, and current/future birth/health workers. This gathering would be historic since there has never been an event of this scope. The gathering will bring together Xicana-Indigneous midwives, doulas, scholars, public health workers, students, and community to learn from each other about the sacredness of birth from diverse cultural perspectives, particularly from women of color. A highlight of this summit would be the keynote address by the authors of the required text in this class. Patrisia Gonzales, the author of Red Medicine: Traditional Indigenous Rites of Birthing and Healing, is a professor in Chicana/o Studies from the University of Arizona and a practicing midwife. In the world of contemporary birth work, there are few Xicana-Indigenous certified midwives, this summit will bring some them together to teach on the topics most relevant to reclaiming birth. This symposium will be mandatory for students from both Chicana/o Studies and Nursing courses. There will be two break-out sessions where several workshops will be conducted by birth workers. The vision of this project is that all participants in this event are teacher and learner. This will be a gathering that will create a space where everyone can contribute skills, experience, expertise, questions, and voice to exploring and improving the pregnancy, birth, and early childhood parenting experience of every woman in our communities. This summit will provide an unparalleled opportunity for each of us to call forward a vision of how we would like to see birth work and birth justice integrate our ancient and modern wisdom to support wellness and health in our communities for future generations to come. Corrine Sanchez (Tewa Women United, New Mexico), Native Women's Movements to Reclaim Birth Film Screenings: No Mas Bebes, about the forced sterilizing of Mexican women in California and Tlakatiliztli, documentary chronicling experiences of urban Xicanas in L.A. seeking natural/home births.

Learning **Outcomes and** Relation to IRA to **Course Offerings**

Chicana/o Studies courses: Reproductive Health and Justice & Identity and Empowerment: Students will be active in the planning and execution of this event. They will be producing a multi-lingual calendar that addresses the health needs of Xicana-Indigenous women as a class project. Students will be reading the work of many of the invited presenters. Students will attend the events and will incorporate them into their community participation requirement for my class. Students from this class will be responsible for hosting the guests and introducing them at the events. The IRA event will be a major focal point of the Reproductive Health & Justice course.

Nursing course: Vulnerable Populations

Dr. Davis-Smith will require participation of her students at this summit as part of the course to begin exploring non-western approaches to health and well-being.

Description of Assessment

Students will be asked write a reflection/evaluation piece on the event and what they learned. There will be evaluation forms at that conclusion of the event and will be used to determine if a program like this is valuable and sustainable for the future.

Target Audience/Student Marketing

The intended audience is primarily students but also community. This will be an opportunity for students to engage with community on a common issue. Students will be working with MICOP and Tequio--Mixteco Indigenous community organizations and will learn first hand traditional birthing practices and experiences from Indigenous women. For Chicana/o Studies and Nursing students, this summit will be a mandatory requirement of the course. Flyers/posters and social media will be the primary method for advertisement to the broader campus community and greater community of Ventura county.
