Brief Activity Description	<p>The 2016 Election is unlike any we have witnessed in American History. Businessman Donald Trump is currently the front runner for the Republican Nomination, and his candidacy marks a sharp break with past campaigns from candidates of either party in terms of tactics and the coalition of supporters. Hillary Clinton is poised to be the first woman nominee of a major party for president, and she is being challenged by an avowed socialist who is garnering much more support than any pundit predicted.</p> <p>To help students make sense of this complicated electoral environment, we are planning a series of events and speakers for the fall semester. Specifically, we will host four separate events around different electoral themes:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Hillary Clinton and women in American politics 2) Latinos, Immigration and the 2016 Election 3) Congress, Polarization and electoral politics 4) Governing in the era of Trump and the Tea Party <p>For each topic, speakers will do two sessions: one session will be for Professor Scott Frisch's course Campaigns and Elections (Political Science 318), and the second session will be open to students from all classes and majors, but will be integrated into each section of Title V graduation requirement course American Political Institutions (Pols 150).</p> <p>For each topic we will invite at least one academic expert and one practitioner to discuss the topic. Professors Frisch and Kelly will serve as moderators and will pose questions to the experts for the open sessions. Frisch and Kelly will invite both locally and nationally known experts depending on their availability to visit campus during the busy election season. We do have commitments from former Congressman Martin Frost (D-TX) and Tom Davis (R-VA) to come to campus to discuss their recent book <i>The Partisan Divide: Congress in Crisis</i>. Frost and Davis have graciously offered to speak on campus without a speaking fee if we cover their travel expenses and allow them to sell copies of their book at the open events. Students will be given the opportunity to interact with leading experts on American politics and pose questions to these thought leaders during an election cycle that promises to be different in so many important ways.</p>
Learning Outcomes and Relation to IRA to Course Offerings	<p>Campaigns and Elections American Political Institutions Political Science Research Methods Political Science Capstone</p> <p>Campaigns and Elections (Political Science 318) is a course where learn about "political parties, campaigns, elections and voting behavior in the American context." Studies will learn about the latest scholarly research on elections and campaigns and will hear from practitioners in the field ranging from politicians and other public officials, to journalists, lobbyists and others who work in the field of electoral politics. Students in this class will be responsible for writing a campaign strategy memo, and students will refine their understanding of real world politics through interacting with experts. In addition, students in POLS 150 will gain greater insight into the structure, function and operation of political campaigns in the United States. Students in virtually all political science classes will benefit from this program, as will all students who are interested in the political process and considering how to vote in the election.</p>

	Students in sections of Political Science 150 will be asked to write reflection papers reacting to the speakers in this series.
Description of Assessment Process	Students attending each speaker's session will complete a survey assessing the experience. Students enrolled in POLS 318 Campaigns and Elections will be asked to write a qualitative assessment of each speaker as well as an overall assessment of the speaker series and its impact on their learning.
