2. Brief Activity Description

Brief Activity Description

The CI Performing Arts Program would like to produce In The Heights (ITH), on the tenth anniversary of its Broadway debut, as part of PA/ART 391 Production, a required PA core-course scheduled for Fall 2018, an elective for Art majors, and open to all students at CI.

A vital component of the learning experience for all PA majors and minors, PA 391 addresses the PA Program Learning Outcomes providing students with an opportunity to collaborate with peers from a diverse range of artistic and cultural backgrounds to produce a live stage performance. Though a required course only for PA majors, enrollment by students from other majors is usually high.

As a musical, In the Heights requires intense collaboration across dance, music, and theatre, aiding in the students' understanding of the intersections between all three art forms. A project of this magnitude is a high impact practice that implements the rigors of live performance and builds upon skills acquired in PA classes by translating them into professional practices necessary for real world preparedness upon graduation.

An ensemble show set on one vibrant block of the Washington Heights neighborhood of New York City, ITH features interwoven stories about a variety of characters living or working on the block, ranging from "Abuela Claudia"--a Cuban immigrant who acts as everyone's grandma, and who took in the owner of the block's bodega, Usnavi, when his parents died in his childhood--to Carla, an employee at Daniela's "Salon Unisex" who describes her identity like this: "My mom is Dominican-Cuban / My dad is from Chile and P.R. which means: / I'm Chile-Domini-Curican... / But I always say I'm from Queens!"

The most notable character for CI's community is Nina, a first generation Latina college student who has just returned home for the summer. Her revelation that she dropped out because she had to work too much to pass her classes throws the tight-knit community into upheaval and drives the plot of the show.

In The Heights won four Tony awards--Best Musical, Best Original Score, Best Choreography, and Best Orchestrations. It was also nominated for the Pulitzer Prize for Drama in 2009. Written by Hamilton composer Lin-Manuel Miranda, In The Heights is an important part of the American Musical Theatre canon and a turning point for its use of rap and other popular music genres. Studying, analyzing, and performing this masterpiece will be an essential stepping stone in our students' academic careers.

The plot lines and focus on a diverse Spanish-speaking immigrant community experience make In The Heights an excellent choice for ALL CI students, staff, faculty and surrounding community to see and engage with. Production and performance of ITH align with CI's mission pillars of integrative studies, multicultural perspectives, and community engagement.

Description of Assessment Process

The traditional form of assessment of a musical is, of course, applause. The sheer number of attendees anticipated for this show (the last time the program produced a musical this popular, it sold out before it opened) makes gathering assessment a big project, but we hope to survey the audience for satisfaction, expectations, and general responses. Several PA courses (those listed in #3 above, among others) require students to attend and complete various written assignments (reports, analyses, essays, journal entries, etc. about the performance), which often provide helpful feedback as well, and instructors will share these with the director with students' permission. SRTs will provide an outlet for enrolled students to assess the course.
