INSTRUCTIONALLY RELATED ACTIVITIES

C H A N N E L I S L A N D S

(1) PROVIDE A DESCRIPTION OF THE ACTIVITY:

The event was a speaker series where we brought in political scientists as well as practitioners in the field of politics. When students evaluated the last speaker series we offered (Spring 2015), several students wrote that they would like to see Political Science faculty present their research. However, we recognized the importance of our students hearing other voices and being exposed to a variety of approaches. As a result, this speaker series partnered some of the department's faculty members with outside speakers that either do research in a related field or can provide practical insight into the topic. In this way, the students were able to see how different academics approach these questions in different ways, and how academic research interacts with real world politics. The topics covered were: politics and policies impacting undocumented college students; intersectionality and political solidarity; energy geopolitics and American hegemony; and Iran, the Middle East, and the Trump Administration.

(2) HOW DID THE ACTIVITY RELATE TO A COURSE(S) AND/OR LEARNING OBJECTIVES?

The speaker series was directly related to three courses: POLS 402: Civil Rights and Civil Liberties (McThomas), POLS 103: International Politics (Scholl), and POLS 353: International Relations of Latin America (Scholl). In addition, students in POLS 300: Political Science Research Methods (Mendez) were taught different research designs and were able to see how the speakers used different methods on diverse issues. Links between the speaker presentations and course material were the subject of writing reflections and class discussions. This allowed students to not only make connections to the course material, but also to see how the questions and issues covered in class are being explored through current research. More generally, our students benefitted from exposure to the speakers' broad range of research topics and methodologies (qualitative, quantitative, indigenous, etc.), meeting top scholars in the field who are interested in issues of diversity and social justice, and seeing examples of academically rigorous research designs that answer difficult and contentious questions. This aided the Political Science program's learning outcomes of teaching our students how to participate as civically engaged members of society, analyze political and policy problems, and critically assess key issues of public policy and politics.

(3) WHAT DO YOU SEE AS THE STRENGTHS OF THE ACTIVITY?

Students were exposed to emerging research and the questions that guided this research. The process of going from questions to practical research was incredibly valuable for students as they pursue their own research and career paths. The research complemented and/or contributed to



course material with the added benefit of the presentations reinforcing the ideas and theories examined in course readings, discussions, and lectures. In addition, we had 121 attendees (sign-in sheets attached) cumulatively over the four events, including students, faculty, and community members. Thus, the speaker series provided informative events for the CI and Camarillo community.

(4) WHAT WOULD YOU SAY ARE/WERE THE ACTIVITY'S WEAKNESSES?

In reaction to feedback from the last speaker series, we tried a new model wherein we based three of the four talks on faculty members and their research. The outside speakers presented on topics somewhat related to the faculty member's field of expertise. While this gave the students the chance to see our work as well as how different academics approach the same questions in different ways (which was the goal), it also limited what topics we offered.

(5) HOW WOULD YOU IMPROVE THIS ACTIVITY FOR NEXT TIME?

I would revert to the previous model in which we invite in people who provide expertise in areas not offered by CI faculty.

(6) WHAT DID YOU LEARN FROM THE PROCESS?

We learned the value of exposing students to an array of different perspectives and the benefit of having such events in addition to normal class activities. One of the strengths of the speaker series was the human element – that is, the students wanted to know about the scholars: why they were interested in this type of research, how they got to be professors, etc. This element is lost when students are only reading the scholars' articles/books.
