# 2. Brief Activity Description

#### **Brief Activity Description**

Celebrating la mujer" is an aesthetic visual and literary dialoque with well-known Chicanx artist Isabel Martínez (or to be named), and other women panel participants from the community, such as the Mexican Consulate, and CI faculty from various programs (History, Art, Global Languages and Cultures, and Chicano Studies). This academic and cultural presentation will explore intersectional feminism by engaging race, class and the multilingual diversity of the mestiza cultural roots within postmodern Chicanx visual art. The speakers' interdisciplinary and multicultural presentations assist in uncovering the underlying of "lo mexicano", Mesoamerican, and Mestizo cultural roots within contemporary Chicanx art. In addition to the exploration of this multilingual race identity experience, this event will examine selected views on intersectional cultural feminism embraced by Latina and Indigenous women. This event will function as a platform for an important interdisciplinary and multicultural scholarly dialogue between the artist, panelists, students, faculty, staff, administrators and community members. Dr. Margarita López López, from the Global Languages and Cultures Program, will facilitate this bilingual dialogue. The artist talk will include a dialogue of the aesthetic, cultural, feminist, historical and pictorial symbolism within her artwork; followed by a discourse with students and those in attendance. It is important to present, exhibit, learn about, and examine the contributions made by dynamic Chicanx artists with respect to their yearning for greater personal integrity as women of color, their empowerment, and their quest for social justice. Chicanx artists are intellectuals whose work embodies theories of resistance and visionary ideals of social change as well as retention of the ancient Mexican matriarchal social traditions. This kind of critical discourse offers participants and attendees an opportunity to explore these realities by viewing compelling art created by an empowered Chicanx artist, while learning about the critical role the arts play in social movements.

### **Learning Outcomes and Relation of IRA to Course Offerings**

The following classes directly relate to the proposed activity:

CHS 100 Chicana/os in Contemporary Society, CHS 352 Aztec Dance and Culture,

Art 112-Eastern Art History, Span 212-Spanish for Heritage Speakers, Spanish 302-Advanced Grammar and Composition II, Span 304-Span for Careers and Professions, Spanish 311-Bilingual Literary Studies (Cross-listed as English 311)

Each class listed above will be given a brief introduction and overview of the visiting artist and information about the Chicana Art and Feminist Movements in class before the main event in order to build background knowledge. Student study guides will be provided and discussed in class, before and after the main event. Students will be expected to write an essay paper about what they learned through this experience.

Cultivate intellect, imagination, sensibility, and sensitivity through the study of culture, language, social movements and the art historical lens.

- -Understand past and current social, cultural, and political issues within the Chicanx community, as well as human behavior and the principles of social interaction.
- -Evaluate the ways in which Chicanx art, history, and culture can interact in various inter-disciplinary contexts.

-Examine and describe from different perspectives the role of Chicanx artists in contemporary culture, and their relationship to the Chicanx Art and Chicanx Feminist Movements in written and oral form on the various aspects of Chicanx art history and culture

-Foster tolerance for and sensitivity to different cultures and value systems through the study of Chicanx art and literature within mainstream Western scholarship.

Evaluate issues and integrate ideas from multiple perspectives and interdisciplinary perspectives.

#### **Description of Assessment Process**

All students will be given a study guide before the main event, in which they will record their learning experiences and answer questions related to the learning outcomes. Students will then be expected to write an essay about this learning experience in which they will be expected to cover all learning outcome expectations.

The study guide will be in Spanish for those students enrolled in the Spanish courses, who will also be expected to write their essays in Spanish. Students will also complete surveys/evaluations.
