Brief Activity Description

The 1st Annual Ephemera Events: Latinx Memory and Social Media Speaker & Exhibition Series is an interdisciplinary semester long program that bridges the interests of students and scholars of art, Chicana/o studies, history, and communications. With the dual themes of memory and social media, Ephemera examines how Latina/o communities employ popular, accessible, and often disposable forms of visual and aesthetic media to address contemporary challenges such as gentrification, historic erasures, racial profiling, mass deportation, and incarceration. Our three-part speaker's series will provide the campus community with an interdisciplinary, bilingual, and direct engagement with cutting edge scholars and artists examining the intersection of social media, Chicana/Latinx culture, and history/place-making. Complementing each speaker will be a gallery exhibition showcasing the featured artist and scholar's work.

Our program begins with DIY: 'Zines and the Los Angeles Latinx Landscape featuring guest speakers Marissa del Toro and Jorge N. Leal who will be discussing their work to document how self-produced fan publications or 'zines have been used by Latina/os to build community and identity in urban landscapes that all too often are alienating for youth of color. In this way, 'zines provide a unique archive documenting often overlooked and misunderstood aspects of Latinx urban culture. 'Zines dedicated to topics such as Chicana punk rock, Latinx LGBT experiences, and other alternative forms of social formations provides a critical counter-narrative that continues to paint US Latina/os as a monolithic and static community. Marissa del Toro is currently working at the Santa Barbara Museum of Art as the new Curatorial Support Group Coordinator. Del Toro graduated with an MA in Art History from the University of Texas at San Antonio, with an overall focus on the modern and contemporary art of Latin American, Latinx, and US artists. Jorge N. Leal holds a Masters in History from California State University, Northridge and is now a Ph.D candidate in the History Department at UC San Diego. Complimenting this presentation will be a curated gallery display proposed to be held in Broome Library 1320 of Latina/o 'zines collected by del Toro.

Our second presentation will feature artist and social media archivist, Guadalupe Rosales. Entitled *Veteranas & Rucas: Memory & Urban Latino Culture*, Rosales will present on her work to actively archive crowd-sourced photos, party flyers, and videos of Chicana/o and Latina/o youth culture in Southern California in the 1990s. Rosales describes her work as an "archive of previously inaccessible material of an underrepresented and unstudied group of people." She received an M.F.A. from the School of the Art Institute of Chicago in 2016. She has held previous residencies at the Guapamacataro Center for Art and Ecology Residency, Ox-Bow School of Art and Artists Residency, and the Los Angeles County Museum of Art's first Instagram residency. Following the 'zine exhibit, an oversized faux smartphone will be installed in Broome Library as images from Rosales archive rotate (or swipe) on the screen.

Our final presentation *The Art of Rebellion: Social Justice and Chicano Visual Arts* will feature artist Jake Prendez, currently residing in Washington State. Mr. Prendez addresses Chicana mediatings of race, culture, activism, social justice, as well as pop culture and satire. His current body of work is highly influenced by Mesoamerican indigenous aesthetics, Early 20th Century Modern Mexican, social realist, tattoo/rockabilly and colorful urban Chicana style art. Prendez's art challenges the Western mainstream museum styled art that are still focused on post 1940's US Abstract Expressionism. Moreover, the artist prefers to works on his own figurative Mass Media production via posters, t-shirts, and other canvasses that are accessible, affordable and mobile and are just as viral as the latest meme or YouTube clip. Mr. Prendez's show, also entitled "The Art of Rebellion" will be presented for a month with additional coordination being provided by Denise Lugo and proposed for the Broome Exhibition Hall.

Specifically, students in courses offered by Theresa Avila, Nicholas Centino, Jennie Luna and Denise Lugo such as Chicana/o Studies 200, 331, and 383, to name a few, will be completing their own cultural memory projects inspired by the speaker and gallery series. These projects may include creating their own 'zines, curating their own digital photo archives, and crafting an engaging public art projects that speaks to pressing issues of our time. These assignments will be completed over the course of the semester roughly timed to coincide with the scheduled presentations of each guest speaker (September 12, October 17, and November 14th).

Description of Assessment Process

This Chicanx/Latinx exhibition and speaker program address vital aspects of CSUCI's campus pillars: especially integrative studies and multicultural engagement. The subject matter's broad appeal will draw students and faculty, and will be open to the community at large. Each speaking engagement will include short evaluative surveys for participants to fill out and submit. Students in classes that assign the talks for course credit will receive a ticket confirming their attendance upon submitting their survey. The survey will also us to gain qualitative data to gauge the effectiveness of our programming. Furthermore, the gallery exhibits will include guestbooks whereby visitors may leave feedback as well as their own memories that may be "cued up" by the exhibits.

Other Sources of Funding

We will be requesting \$200 sponsorships from Art, History, and the Chicana/o Studies program, respectively. Additionally, Denise Lugo is offering her art insurance in-kind to be put towards the shipment of Jake Prendez's artwork. This insurance coverage is roughly \$200 to cover the total value of the artwork (appraised at \$4500). Lastly, we will be asking the Broome Library to co-sponsor by providing display cases and space in-kind.

All events will take place on the CSUCI campus and are open to the public. Signage will be located outside all venues inviting viewers. A broad range of CSUCI students are the audience for the displays and lectures, as is indicated by the numerous fields of study with which the show and lectures intersect. The event will be promoted through targeted promotional efforts to group listserves across campus, announcements to faculty from those classes listed above, and through printed posters hung around the campus.

To ensure reaching a broad audience we have requested funding for a variety of promotional materials such as tabloid sized full-color flyers, brochures designed to mimic the aesthetic of a DIY 'zine, and commemorative prints/posters.
