NEW MLA (8TH ED)

Writers to follows citation rules / formula based on source's publication format such as book, journal article, Web page, YouTube article.

Publication format no longer guides style. Writer should follow principles of MLA documentation by including core elements.

There are **nine MLA core elements** and they are basic pieces of information that should be common to all sources.

Purdue Online Writing Lab (OWL) still provides the most upto-date information for MLA Formatting and Style. While Purdue also provides suggestions for following citation rules by publication format (because this is what we are familiar with), keep in mind that writers should follow core elements rather than "fixed rules." 1 Author.
2 Title of source.
3 Title of container,
4 Other contributors,
5 Version,
6 Number,
7 Publisher,
8 Publication date,
9 Location.
